CHAC's convention 2004 is about leadership in Catholic health care. This theme follows naturally from last year's National Dialogue and Forum when members highlighted leadership at all levels, both individual and institutional, as an essential component of their vision for the Catholic health ministry in Canada. During this convention we will learn more about leadership; we will also be asked to take leadership with respect to future directions for the CHAC.

Leadership takes place in the context of evolution and change. It is manifested in the lives of individuals and of organizations. It is inspired by examples of leaders from the past who have responded to society's needs with courage and creativity.

My expectation during this convention and assembly is to finalize these tough decisions, to set a milestone in the life of our evolving association, and to provide inspired leadership for Catholic health care in the present and in the future.
