
As the teaching of Nursing Science in Ontario is now transferred to the Universities, the change is no doubt to the advantage of this branch of education.

My dear Graduates:

It is a distinct pleasure for me to respond to your invitation to write a farewell message and a brief history of St. Joseph's School of Nursing for the last issue of SEDULA NUTRIX. No account of the School of Nursing can be complete unless it is seen as part of the growth and development of St. Joseph's General Hospital. This growth is a story of trust in Divine Providence and of courageous faith in people whose loyalty has ever endured.

The Sisters of St. Joseph arrived at Prince Arthur's Landing in 1881 to open an elementary school in the convent on Algoma Street. Very shortly afterwards, as the railway pushed westward, the Sisters found themselves caring for accident and typhoid victims. Soon the need of a hospital was felt by Mother Monica who was encouraged by energetic, far-sighted and public-spirited citizens of the local community. From the archives of the Public Libraries of Thunder Bay and the News Chronicle office we learn that Reverend Father Hamel S.J., Pastor of St. Andrew's Church, in the presence of parishioners and townspeople of other denominations laid the cornerstone of the first hospital on September 9, 1884. Successive additions were added in 1900, 1905, 1915 and 1928, all of which were developed under the guiding hand of Mother Monica. Until the day of her death, January 23, 1931, she devoted herself tirelessly to the sick and injured. In 1934 the city of Port Arthur reached the half-century mark as did St. Joseph's Hospital. At this time Mother Monica was honoured by the citizens of Port Arthur by the erection of a memorial statue of St. Joseph which still stands proudly on the hospital grounds facing Algoma Street.

In 1955 it was obvious that the hospital facilities were in need of replacement. A building program was launched which, over the next twelve years, saw the demolition of the entire hospital and its replacement by a \$7,000,000.00 structure.

Like the Hospital, the School of Nursing too had a humble beginning. Love and self-sacrifice were the foundation stones of this great undertaking. "Amen I say to you; as long as you did it to one of these, the least of my brethern, you did it to Me." (Matt. 25:40). "Quod Minimus mihi Fecisti" is the motto of St. Joseph's School of Nursing until the present day.

In 1904 when the School of Nursing was opened, the student nurses lived in a portion of the Hospital. With the growth of the School it became necessary in 1928 to find more residence space; so the Neelin Homestead on Court St. Ridge was purchased and used. Later the beautiful Conmee Residence became a valuable adjunct to the School of Nursing. The student nurses benefited from the group living made possible for them in these "homey" surroundings. In 1955 still further growth and changes in Nursing Education required more and better facilities for teaching. A modern, beautifully-equipped, one

hundred and eight bed Nurses' Residence and School of nursing was built at a cost of \$700,000.00. During the next ten years the education of nurses underwent many changes. St. Joseph's School of Nursing can be justly proud of the contribution it has made to the nursing profession. Because of advances in medical knowledge and other technological discoveries the need to make more effective use of highly skilled personnel was obvious. It was arranged in 1961 that student nurses of all three Lakehead Schools of Nursing would take certain subjects at the Lakehead College of Arts, Science and Technology, which later became Lakehead University. The individual schools however remained autonomous. It soon became apparent that further regional planning was necessary. The outcome was the formation of a joint Planning Committee, composed of representatives from Port Arthur General, McKeller, St. Joseph's and the Lakehead University, to chart the course of Nursing Education for the Lakehead. In 1967, after six years and countless meetings the Lakehead Regional School of Nursing became a reality. This meant that the original Schools of Nursing phased out. This peaceful yet vibrant closing of St. Joseph's School of Nursing brings to mind the Scriptural passage from John 12:24: "Unless the grain of wheat falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a grain. But if it dies it yields rich harvest." Similarly, on January 1, 1970, the cities of Port Arthur and Fort William were phased out to make possible the greater city of Thunder Bay.

My dear Graduates, doubts, fears and tensions are certain to be present as you leave the known way to develop newer concepts of nursing education to meet new trends in the ever-changing field of health. In your pursuit of excellence, I leave you with this thought so well-expressed by M. L. Haskins -

I said to the man
who stood at the gate of the Year:

"Give me a Light
that I may tread safely
into the Unknown"
and he replied:

"Go out into the Darkness
and put your hand into
the Hand of God.
That shall be to you
better than Light
and safer that a
Known Way."

In closing it is fitting to pay tribute to all who have given of their talents to St. Joseph's School of Nursing in any way during the past sixty-six years, and in particular to the devoted Directors of Nursing, Faculty and 845 Graduates. In the name of all I proudly salute and bid farewell to a truly great School of Nursing.
