## **THE DREAM**

On a hill overlooking a bay on beautiful Lake Kamaniskeg, just outside the Village of Barry's Bay stands St. Francis Memorial Hospital. It is a testimonial to the individuals and the small hardworking community who, for twelve years, pursued their dream to build a community hospital and saw it realized in 1960.

The very early descriptions of the new St. Francis Memorial Hospital included the promise that it would be founded on the best principles and traditions of medicine. The works of mercy delivered would serve all mankind regardless of race or religion. This was endorsed by the community and the overwhelming number of residents who worked tirelessly to raise the community portion of the initial funds and support the Hospital.

On October 25, 1960 when Premier Leslie Frost cut the ribbon to officially open St. Francis Memorial Hospital it was a day of celebration for the huge crowd in attendance. There was a definite pride in the accomplishments of a collection of small communities to establish their own hospital - a feeling that is still evident today through continuing community support.

As we celebrate the 50th anniversary of St. Francis Memorial Hospital we are pleased to look back and provide a brief history of the Hospital and recognize the people and events that made the dream a reality.

## St. Francis Hospital Ready for Admittance of Patients

The newly constructed St. Francis Memorial Hospital in Barry's Bay commenced admitting patients Thursday Dec. 1.

.....Although the entire Hospital will not be opened immediately the maternity and medical wards are prepared for patients at the present time, and the other portions such as surgery etc. will be opened very shortly.

..... The staff employed by the Hospital will number 36 which includes seven sisters that have been working so vigorously in preparing the hospital. There are five registered nurses, two of which are sisters.

## Hospital used Extensively

The new St. Francis Memorial Hospital which opened on Dec. 1st for admittance of patients has been used extensively by the residents of this district which it serves.

Up until Wednesday noon, Dec. 21st, we were informed that 57 patients had been admitted, some of whom have been discharged, and ten babies have been born in the new hospital, that since the hospital was completed, considerably more interest has been shown regarding Hospital Insurance, and an increase is noticed in the number of people in the area applying for this hospital coverage. In the event of anyone wishing to apply for insurance application forms are obtainable at the bank.






Surgery was phased out when Dr. Chapeskie decreased his number of cases and a replacement surgeon could not be found.



## End of era for St. Francis Hospital

The departure of Sister Rosenda marks the end of an era for St. Francis Memorial Hospital and for Barry's Bay.

Since the opening of the hospital in 1960 the Sisters of St. Joseph, of the Diocese of Pembroke have been the driving force behind the hospital's well-earned reputation for the high standard of care available to its patients.

The original governing board of the hospital, consisting of Henry J. Chapeskie, president; Chris

Corrigan, Maxie Mintha, Paul Yakabuski and Edward Shalla, asked the sisters to handle the administration of the new hospital.

The first sisters to be appointed were Sister Emma Varney, administrator; Sister Edna Prince, director of nursing; Sister Martha Prince, operating room supervisor and medical records; Sister Imelda Coyne, laboratory and X-ray technologist; Sister St.

John, housekeeper; Sister Anita Levair, dietary department; and Sister Ros-

enda Brady, business manager.

During the 15 years of the sisters' service, many local people worked in the hospital and then continued their studies to become professionally qualified for their positions. About four years ago the Sisters of St. Joseph began to withdraw from key positions to make way for lay people to assume administration of the hos-

pital.

Sister Rosenda Brady, administrator, the last to withdraw, reports all de-

partments are well staffed with qualified people and all are well-equipped.

The Sisters of St. Joseph wish to thank all the people of the area, especially the members of the governing board, the medical staff, the women's hospital auxiliary, and all hospital staff members for their tremendous cooperation in achieving the standard of quality care the hospital can offer to its patients.

They also extend special appreciation to Msgr. A.J. Maika, and to the first

hospital chaplain, Rev. J.K. O'Brien. Rev. Leonard Ritzá served as hospital chaplain from 1963 to 1970, when he retired from the Canadian Army Chaplain Corps with the rank of Lt. Colonel. The community was grieved by his death in 1974.

A very special thanks also to all the ministers and other clergy for their interest and support over the years.

The Sisters of St. Joseph, while leaving administration of the hospital, will always be interested in St. Francis, especially in the area of pastoral care. They say it has been a privilege to serve the community over the past 15 years through St. Francis Memorial Hospital.

## Renovations Needed at St. Francis Memorial

Built in 1960, St. Francis Memorial Hospital is now 20 years old and like any structure the time has come for renovations and changes to meet today's needs.

This was the message spelled out by the Hospital Board to a number of clergy of the area at a meeting held last week in the Church of the Epiphany Hall in Barry's Bay.

Like many other hospitals, St. Francis Memorial must change to meet the needs of an aging population. This means that more chronic beds are needed than a few years ago.

Using audio visual techniques, Mr. John Trant, Chairman of the Board gave an explanation demonstrating the changes needed, why, and how the Board hopes to implement these changes.

At the present time, the hospital has 34 beds; 9 of which are termed chronic beds and the balance active. However, a total of 14-16 beds are being occupied by chronic patients,

thus reducing the beds available for active patients. At this point there is no flexibility as the hospital is operating at 100%.

Mr. Trant outlined some of the areas where the present facilities are not adequate or where renovations are needed to make the services more efficient. In most cases, this means more space and some services such as emergency entrance being relocated and more space for medical records, physiotherapy, nursing administration area, laboratory, to mention a few. Laboratory equipment must be kept up to date and this, too, costs a great deal.

A survey has been done on the needs and a final plan will be submitted to the Department of Health. Following that approval, plans can be made for a "Campaign for Funds", hopefully in the new year.

Until a plan is approved, it is not known what the cost will be. However, the amount to be raised locally could be one-third of the total with the

balance paid by the Ministry.

Following a discussion on various services of the Hospital, the group moved to St. Francis Hospital where Mr. Trant and Mr. Robertson, Administrator, toured the

hospital and showed the group the present facilities and pointed out some of the inadequacies of the present situation.

One area of the hospital being used less is the surgical area. There are several reasons for the

## Final Approvals for the Expansion of St. Francis Memorial Hospital



After many hours of planning the final stamp of approval for the expansion of St. Francis Memorial was awarded in September 1983. The new addition provided a 17 bed chronic care wing, a new emergency department, the creation of private patient rooms, the addition of air

conditioning and electric heating as well as other changes involving almost every department in the Hospital. The total cost of the expansion was projected at 2.8 million of which the province provided five-sixths leaving the community to raise \$600,000.






## The History of the Name St. Francis Memorial



Twenty-four ladies, representing various groups in the district, assembled on September 22, 1960 to discuss the possibility of organizing a Women's Hospital Auxiliary to function in conjunction with the St. Francis Memorial Hospital in Barry's Bay, Ontario which is slated to open on Tuesday Oct. 25, 1960.

A general meeting was held Oct. 6, and various committees were established: a Ways and Means Committee, Special Teas, Cutting and Sewing, Press and Public Relations, Gift Shop and Tuck Shop Cart.

The first job of the Auxiliary was Operation Clean-up. The ladies gathered at the Hospital on Oct 24, to prepare for the official opening of the hospital the next day. They also decided to have a pantry shower to help stock the Hospital kitchen with food staples and utensils. Pantry showers continued to be held every year to help keep the kitchen stocked.

The Gift Shop was opened Nov. 21, 1960 with sixteen donated items. A tuck shop cart was purchased for \$29.00 and operated for many years.

In the past 50 years, the Auxiliary, now consisting of men and women, continue to serve the needs of the Hospital with insurmountable zeal and devotion, giving voluntarily of their time, effort, energy, and experience.





The realization of the dream of St. Francis Memorial is a tribute and testimonial to Rt. Reverend Monsignor Peter Biernacki, Parish Priest of St. Hedwig's Church in Barry's Bay. The foresight, determination and vision of Msgr. Biernacki were significant factors in the planning and building of the Hospital. As a humanitarian and advocate for the people, he was strongly aware of the need for a hospital and medical care for a growing community. and launched the dream. His efforts in the community and as a leader on the first St. Francis Memorial Hospital Association were key, but fate has its own designs and Msgr. Biernacki was denied the privilege of seeing the culmination of his dedication and work, he passed away Dec. 31, 1958.

Mr. Henry J. Chapeskie, an experienced businessman, dedicated parishioner, and community minded citizen was involved in establishing the Hospital since inception. In 1947 he donated the land and formulated the plans for the Hospital. He obtained the charter from the province in 1952 and served as treasurer for twelve years on the Hospital Association. In 1959, upon Msgr. Biernacki's death, he continued the dream by accepting the position of Hospital Board President and assumed the responsibility for construction and completion of the Hospital in 1960.





## Renovations ongoing at St. Francis Memorial Hospital

The past few weeks have been busy for many people at St. Francis Memorial Hospital - and not just those in the medical field.

Renovations have been ongoing due to the imminent arrival of the new x-ray machine - which is now operational.

Hospital administrator

Kerry O'Reilly noted that changes include moving administration upstairs; relocating medical records from the back of the hospital to the front; doing renovations to provide two large trauma units in the emergency area; and renovating the former medical records room into a waiting room. Rooms are also

being renovated for ultrasound and EKGs.

What the renovations mean are no more sitting in the hallway or lobby waiting to get x-ray or lab work completed; it also means that there is more room to work around a trauma patient; and that emergency room patients won't have to travel the main cor-

ridor to get to the lab or x-ray areas.

"The renovations and relocations have gone smoothly," O'Reilly stated.



Dr. Ray Dawes, Chief of Medical Staff at St. Francis Memorial Hospital, said the renovations and the updating of equipment is expanding the capabilities

the successful implementation of the vision being established. The Boards request the support of the HSRC, Champlain District Health Council, the Ministry of Health, our patients, staff and physicians to allow the time to successfully implement this new direction."

Under the partnership, each hospital will retain its independent Boards of Governance and Foundation, and two separate corporations will be maintained. Once the change takes place, the feasibility of expanding such programs as Dialysis, Oncology and other medical support services will be reviewed. These programs are presently in place at Renfrew and lend themselves nicely to possible expansion to St. Francis.

Both hospital boards feel the move to one administration is a step in the right direction.

"It is apparent that the status quo is no longer an option," said in Douglas, chairman of the St. Francis Board. "If you look at the Rural and Northern Healthcare framework and the directions of the Health Services Restructuring Commission, this is a major step in the right direction for our hospitals."

Gerry Richards, chairman of the Renfrew Victoria Hospital Board, said the two boards and new administration team now need time to implement this significant change.

Mr. Penney said there are several opportunities where Renfrew

and Barry's Bay can work together to save money and improve services to patients.

"We have had an awful lot of success in this organization of bringing clinical programs to the region and the natural evolution would be to try to bring those into places like Barry's Bay," he said.

Mr. Penney said it was increasingly apparent the status quo is not an option.

"We have to look at alternate ways and if there is an opportunity to save in administration we have to look in that direction.

"But I really think the patient will benefit in both organizations," he said.

Mr. O'Reilly said he was excited about the new partnership, adding it was a great opportunity for both hospitals.

"There is an avenue for better



In 1998 and 1999 the provincial Health Services Restructuring Commission was sweeping through the province making decisions about Hospital services. In Pembroke the review for Renfrew County resulted in closure of the Pembroke Civic Hospital.

The Boards and Administrators of St. Francis Memorial Hospital and Renfrew Victoria Hospital decided the time was right to act to choose their own destiny. In December 1999 the voluntary administrative partnership between both Hospitals was announced. With an administrative position vacant at both Hospitals the timing was right to place both Hospitals under one administration. The voluntary shared partnership retained each Hospital's Board and unique community culture.

This new model was unique to the province and was recognized for its' leadership and direction by the Minister of Health and Long Term Care Elizabeth Witmer.

For St. Francis the partnership brought expertise, growth, and access to valuable new services such as hemodialysis and Ontario Breast Screening.



He set up the hospital on Bay St. in the large home of Anthony and Mary Maika. While Mr. Maika was working away as foreman in the lumber camps, Mary Maika with the help of her daughters Frances, Ursula, and Eleanor provided for the patients who occupied three bedrooms in their home. Operations were performed on the dining room table assisted by Dr. Gregor, Dr. John V. Byrne and Dr. Smyth's wife, who was a registered nurse.


After about five years of operation Dr. Smyth sold his practice to Dr. John Byrne and moved to Toronto. The hospital ceased to operate in the early 1940's.

## Planning for the new Hospital begins....



It is a beautiful location on the waters of the Bay, with nearby pine woods contributing health-giving properties. When financial arrangements are satisfactory, building operations will begin. The provincial government will grant \$30,000 for the 30-bed hospital, a like amount is expected from the Dominion government and there is a vote of \$15,000 from Renfrew County Council.

Rt. Rev. P.B. Biernacki, PP, of St. Hedwig's Church, is one of the active promoters of the hospital, and is in Toronto this week interviewing the Minister of Health.







## Telehealth a major addition for St. Francis Memorial Hospital

**Barry's Bay** — In a hospital where recent additions of services like mammography and dialysis have contributed to keeping its place as one of the leading providers of health care in the valley, it is somewhat hard to imagine what St. Francis Memorial Hospital could do next to top the list.

But move on they have, with last week's sneak preview of a wonderful addition to the facility, a video link to the Telehealth network. Although in its infancy and not officially on-line yet, Thursday's preview at St. Francis, provided the realization of the benefits of this service.

No longer will residents of Barry's Bay and area have to make long, tiring treks to Ottawa, Renfrew, Pembroke, or wherever, for follow-up clinical visits or even diagnosis, as it will soon be available over the Telehealth system.

Now one of 16 healthcare facilities of the Eastern Ontario Telehealth Network (EOTN), St. Francis is part of a precedent-setting service that will create immense benefits for both staff and patients of rural hospitals.

According to a brochure explaining the EOTN, the main goal of the network is to improve access to healthcare services, education and expertise in rural communities where resources are often scarce. These services, although not all ready to be activated immediately, can eventually include cardiac, paediatric, complex continuing, long-term rehabilitation, and palliative care.

"Telehealth is a new service that we are bringing to this area and what it is really is equipment here through which a specialist in Ottawa can talk to a person here, see a person here, examine them

here with special equipment, so you don't have to go to Ottawa," explained assistant administrator, Darlene Sernoskie. "It's a new venture that is part of the whole region of 19 Ontario hospitals involved in it."

Susan Coulas, who, along with Joan Kuiack, is one of two trained operators of the service at St. Francis, gave an informative demonstration of the system last Thursday following the volunteer luncheon.

"The term Telehealth is really a broad term that talks about delivering health information," Ms. Coulas noted. "This is not the same as Telehealth Ontario, which is the 1-800 telephone number that is out there for delivering telephone advice. "This telehealth system consists of a computer system, video monitor, and a camera which are all part of

the technology which is used, as well as some different medical instruments."

Ms. Coulas demonstrated the unit by going on-line with her counterpart at Renfrew Victoria Hospital, St. Francis' sister hospital in Renfrew. Darlene Sernoskie

# Hospitals restrict access in response to SARS outbreak

## Small town heroes working on a big-city crisis

The little group pulled down their masks, shrugged off lab coats and slipped outside for a photo. They held up the poster, grinned for the camera and when the shot was taken, disappeared back inside the hospital.

The poster shows a masked nurse, hair askew and an unfathomable look in her eyes. The text reads:

"She is one of thousands of heroes of health care professionals who are on the front line in our war against SARS. They are deal-

front-and-centre in the battle against Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS).

St. Francis Memorial Hospital administrators released a similar statement Friday to the Madawaska Valley community, which reads:

"The Board of Directors, medical staff and staff of St. Francis Memorial Hospital would like to thank the community for their support and patience in complying with the restrictions since the beginning of the SARS outbreak six weeks ago. ## Local hospital offers new CCAC nursing clinic

Representatives from the St. Francis Memorial Hospital say a nursing pilot project had a slow start, but it is slowly gaining momentum.

Director of Patient Services at SFMH, Joan Kuiack, and Chief Operating Officer Jeremy Stevenson provided an update on the new Champlain Community Care Access Centre (CCAC) nursing clinic on July 9.

Prior to the new clinic, the CCAC only offered at-home care for local patients. There are 14 CCACs in communities across Ontario, which are funded by Local Health Integration Networks through the Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care. SFMH recently entered into a partnership with CCAC to see if a nursing clinic was feasible in the hospital.

"For a few years now the hospital has been working in partnership with the CCAC and looking at ways on how we can improve CCAC services," Stevenson said. "It's sometimes hard to serve the population in the area, especially with everyone living a distance apart. But if we have the clinic here, they would be able to serve the population that they usually see in the community."

The ten-week clinic began on June 28 and is operating out of the Emergency Department at the SFMH. Patients are referred to the clinic through physicians, usually in the Emergency Department.



The grand niece of Msgr. Biernacki, seven year old Beverly Flynn, assisted Hon. Leslie M. Frost in the official ribbon cutting to open St. Francis Memorial Hospital. She was to have presented the Premier with the scissors to be used in the ceremony, but Mr. Frost – in a grand gesture of respect for her late uncle – insisted that she share the scissors and assist with the ribbon cutting. He gave the little girl a piece of the ribbon as a small keepsake and a gentle kiss on the cheek.

Premiere Frost opened the Hospital with the words, "I now declare St. Francis Memorial Hospital officially open and launch it on its' career of usefulness and mercy for this great part of Ontario."

The 300 x 44 foot brick building of modern design was constructed in 15 months by M. J. Sullivan and Sons. J. Morris Woolfson of Ottawa was the architect. The total estimated cost of the building was \$350,000. with equipment and furnishings costing an extra \$85,000.


