1944


The School for X-Ray Technicians enrolled its first four students.

TENTH YEAR FOR LIBRARIANS' SCHOOL

The Edmonton General Hospital School of Medical Record Librarians opened its doors in the month of January, 1955. Since that time, it has had 85 young girls who graduated and are now recognized across Canada as registered record librarians through the board of registration of the Canadian Association of Medical Record Librarians.

The school takes every opportunity to give each student all the theoretical knowledge possible, with the necessary practice to acquire all the technical skills which will qualify them as organizer and manager of any medical record department in hospitals, clinics, doctor's offices and health agencies.

The purpose of the course is: 1—To elevate the standards of medical records in the hospitals thereby elevating the standards of patient-care; 2—To give effective academic and practical experience to enable the student to master the knowledge and skill required to perform all duties of a medical record librarian; 3—To develop in a student a clear understanding of her professional status, making her conscious of all qualities which will meet the needs of the patient — the physician — and the hospital.

The school's philosophy is to develop the characteristics and personality traits expected to be found in any professional para-medical groups.

APPLICANTS ELIGIBLE:

To be eligible for this training, the candidates should have good physical health, a sound moral character, a mature personality, and leadership ability as well as good sound judgement.

Her future duties as custodian of records, will demand proper and adequate training. She will be shown how to analyse, assemble, and check each medical record, in order to be able to determine its completeness and its accuracy and adequacy before storing these records away.

She is taught to remain ever conscious of the fact that medical records are kept to benefit the patient, the hospital, and the doctor and contribute greatly in medical research and educational program.

The applicant must have senior matriculation with an average of 65 per cent, and/or school diploma and/or nursing registration of an approved nursing school. She must also have typing and dietaphone ability.

CURRICULUM:

The curriculum is the one approved by the registrar of the Canadian Association of Medical Record Librarians. It is a twelve-month course, with four hundred and fifty hours of theoretical lectures; eight hundred and seventy hours of practical assignments under the close supervision of a registered record librarian.

Towards the end of their training, arrangements are made to visit different sized hospitals, clinics, health agencies, etc. These field trips are greatly appreciated by the students as they feel they are most helpful in broadening their views.

The theory taught during the year includes the following: anatomy and physiology — 100 hours; introduction to medical science — 75 hours; medical terminology — 45 hours; medical record science — 191 hours.

The medical record science theory includes: history of hospitals; history of medical records in all its aspects; organization and management of a well-organized department; all systems used in such a department; the two methods in use for coding diseases and operations, etc.

They are well informed of the new trends pertaining to a medical record department. They are made aware of the fact that they will succeed in their professional career inasmuch as they keep pace with progress or new developments in our special field. To walk step by step with the scientific age will lead them to the right goal.

Once the whole curriculum has been discussed and studied, they must pass an examination on the theory taught as a whole. If they are successful, they are given a graduation pin and certificate issued by their own school. Each graduate is to write another examination set by the registrar of the Canadian Association of Medical Record Librarians and if she obtains a 75

per cent pass mark she then becomes a Registered Record Librarian (RRL).

All graduates recite the Medical Record Librarian Pledge which consists of all qualities which they should endeavour to uphold throughout their career as Professional Medical Record Librarians.



The silver tints of the clouds of doubt


