



St. Joseph's Hospital 1890

Founding of St. Joseph's Hospital:

In the year 1890, after urgent requests and appeals of medical men and citizens of the City of Hamilton, and realizing the long-felt need of a hospital in the south-west end of the City, the Sisters of St. Joseph's Community decided to establish a hospital here.

The problem of location was readily solved by the unfailing generosity of the late Bishop T. J. Dowling, who placed his newly acquired home on John St. South, the former residence of the Hon. John Young, at their disposal, one of the most ideal sites on the Continent.

St. Joseph's Hospital—Formal Opening—June 1890:—

On the 11th of June, 1890, St. Joseph's Hospital, with a capacity of twenty-five beds, was formally opened, under the capable direction of Mother Philip, assisted by Sisters Antoinette, Camilla, Marcelline, Herman and Bride.

That works of charity begun in the name of Divine Providence, cannot fail to develop and increase, was manifested by the rapid growth of the Institution. The people of Hamilton of all denominations showed their approval. From sources the most unexpected, came the means for the maintenance of the afflicted, who, without question of creed or nationality, found under the care of the Sisters, refuge and kindly attention graciously given.

The Ryan Ward was endowed by the late Father Ryan of Oakville, for the benefit of poor patients, and hs been maintained as such down through the years to the present day.

Incorporation:

The Sisters of St. Joseph of the Diocese of Hamilton were first incorporated in 1879, when they had only one hospital (Guelph), St. Mary's Orphanage (Hamilton, Ontario) and the House of Providence (Guelph).

The Act was again renewed by Parliament to meet certain requirements in 1902.

And the last Act under the same title of "Sisters of St. Joseph" of the Diocese of Hamilton, October 1938.

Revised Statutes of Ontario, Chapter 69, 2 G VI.

The elected Council constitute the Board of Directors, and regular meetings are held to regulate the affairs of the houses and hospitals included in this Act.

The following description of the Hospital was given in "The Hamilton Evening Times," Thursday, June 12, 1890:—

"The building proper is a large, solid, three-storey building, finished in the most perfect manner from cellar to garret. At the entrance is a massive stone portico and balcony, and on the first floor, the visitor is struck with the wide halls and high ceilings, the spacious reception rooms and beautiful Chapel, which was previously the drawing-room. The beautiful crystal candelabra chandeliers, which had been part of the former furnishings, added dignity and beauty to the new Chapel, in which there is placed an exquisite altar, the gift of Contractor Pigott, father of Joseph and Roy Pigott, Contractors, Hamilton, Ontario.

The second and third stories are divided into wards and private rooms, well lighted, well ventilated, and also well heated. The walls and

all the surroundings are of the most cheerful character, while the bathrooms, and all furnishings are of the most approved style.

The magnificent grounds are in keeping with the buildings. They are separated from John Street by a solid stone fence, with stone coping and fancy iron finish, and a pair of huge iron gates. Altogether, it is a very beautiful spot, from which the patients can oversee the whole city; can also watch the boats floating up and down the Bay to the Beach. And on a clear day, a large portion of Lake Ontario can be seen from the upper windows."

The first operation was performed by Dr. Roseberg on June 21, 1890, the description of which appears in the diagram below, as shown in the annals of the Hospital.




CHART OF FIRST OPERATION

Description of Hospital (Continued):-

Dr. Chamberlain, the Inspector of Hospitals, paid his first visit on October 16, 1890.

On December 10th of the same year, the Doctors held a meeting at the Hospital, for the purpose of forming an Attending Staff. The following Staff was appointed:—

Dr. White (Chairman), Drs. Leslie Stark, Wallace, Anderson, Bingham, Gaviller, McCabe and Osborne.

December 5, 1890:-

The Stations of the Cross, presented by Mrs. Alborn, were canonically erected by His Lordship, the Right Rev. T. J. Dowling. Rev. Chancellor Craven, Rev. F. McEvoy, Rev. R. Brady, Rev. J. Maloney, and Rev. P. Haley were present at the ceremony.

January 3, 1891:-

On this date, two statues, one of the Blessed Virgin, and one of St. Joseph, gifts of F. N. Messner, of Formosa, were solemnly blessed and erected by Bishop T. J. Dowling.

The sum of \$500.00 was bequeathed to the Hospital by Mr. Murray, Cayuga, Ontario, on June 2, 1891.

The first money received from the Government was \$112.00, being half of the grant for the first term (June 21, to October 1, 1890).

The statistical report for the first year, dating from October 1, 1890, to September 30, 1891, shows:—

St. Ann's Wing:-

In 1894, St. Ann's Wing was erected, increasing the accommodation to fifty beds.

The description which appeared in "The Hamilton Herald" is as follows:—

"December 9, 1894:-

The first floor contains the offices, dispensary, one private ward, one Public ward (for men) 18x30; Service room; Lavatories; main and private stair-ways.

On the second floor, there are three private wards, and a Women's ward (Public) over the Men's.

On the third floor, there are seven private rooms; serving rooms and lavatories. The rooms are fitted out with mantles and gas jets.

At the south-west corner of the building, there is a Chloroform room and an Operating room. The latter leads off the former. The latter is built in the shape of an actagon with eight windows, and with a sky-light at the top. The floor, walls and ceilings are granolithic, there being a total absence of woodwork in the room, excepting the window frames, and a special arrangement of gas fixtures.

In 1902 Dr. I. Olmstead provided electric wiring and fixtures for the Operating room and Dr. Balfe provided a complete set of Surgical Instruments.

Running along the west end of the wing from each floor is a verandah, to which there is access from the through flats.

In was decided to build the wing after \$5,000.00 was bequeathed at that time by Mrs. Dowling, mother of Bishop Dowling.

The cost of the building was \$12,000.00 with more commodious quarters. It is needless to say, the Sisters of St. Joseph will be encouraged in their good work, and actuated to take a deeper interest in their labor of love, if that is possible.

Mr. Robt. Clohecy was the Architect and Superintendent. The Contractors, Brick and Stone work, G. E. Mills; Carpenter work, White & Wark; Painting, K. Scully; Slating, T. Irwin & Son; Tinsmithing, James Sweeney; Hot Water Heating and Plumbing, S. Milne; Plastering, John Chapman & Son; Boilers and Radiators, Gurney, Tilden & Company.

X-Ray Department-1912:-

In 1912 the X-Ray Department was opened through the assistance of the late Dr. James Edgar, and under the guidance of the late Dr. L. R. Hess, M.B., F.A., C.P.

The equipment consisted of an induction coil, using glass plates, and the developing was done in a dark room across the hall.

Laboratory:-

The first Laboratory work was begun by Dr. A. D. Unsworth, who gave unsparingly of his time in instructing the Sisters in Laboratory technique. Dr. F. B. Bowman was the first Pathologist.



SURGICAL WING ADDED

Surgical Wing-1916:-

The necessity for greater accommodation steadily increased and in 1916, the Surgical Wing was added.

On the first floor, facing the entrance on John Street, the Chapel was built, the former Chapel space being used for the Main Office. On either side of the main hall, there was an eight-bed ward with a sun-porch off each, with private rooms between. The second and third floors contained private rooms, semi-private and four-bed wards.

At the corner of the third floor, an Operating Room Suite was built, containing all the modern equipment available at that time.

In the same year, the Hospital engaged its first Interne. It is rather interesting to note that Dr. W. P. Downes was the first Interne and at present, thirty-four years later, is the President of the Medical Staff, the office he has held for the past fifteen years.

Since the addition of the new wing in 1947 this former Surgical Wing has been used for Medical patients.

Standardization of Hospital-1923:-

In 1923, the Medical Staff was re-organized under the direction of Dr. H. J. Sullivan, its first Chairman. The Hospital was recognized by the American College of Surgeons, and standardized in Grade A, according to their requirements.

Up to 1924, very little space was reserved for Maternity patients. During this year, the Bisby home on Charlton Avenue was purchased and equipped with modern apparatus and furnishings. It accommodated 25 mothers and babies.

The building was called "Casa Maria" which means "House of Mary." A room which was Mrs. Bisby's private bourdoir when she occupied the house, was furnished as a token of love and in memory of Mrs. Bisby by her nephew, W. H. Hunt.

With the addition of this number of beds for patients, St. Joseph's Hospital now accommodated 200 patients.

In this same year St. Monica's Ward for children was opened in a division where female medical patients formerly had been accommodated.

The white brick building in the rear of the Hospital was built in 1929 for the accommodation of male and female domestic employees.

The Hospital Auxiliary:-

On May 22, 1945, a meeting of representatives from the parishes of the city and the surrounding districts was arranged to take place at the Nurses' Residence, St. Joseph's Hospital, Hamilton. Mrs. F. E.

Regan, President of the Catholic Women's League, in the opening address explained that the members of the Central division of the Catholic Women's League were assembled for the purpose of organizing an Auxiliary for St. Joseph's Hospital, under the Patronage of His Excellency, Most Reverend J. F. Ryan.

At this meeting an Executive was elected, the members of which were:—

The large number present and their keen interest was an encouraging indication of their approval of the newly formed organization.

Since its inception the Auxiliary has to its credit a series of splendid achievements. The fine spirit of co-operation of all members and the organizing ability of the officers appointed has combined in making each of the many undertakings a decided success. Outstanding events have been the Tag Days, the Valentine Dances at the Royal Connaught, the Membership Teas and the Bridges at the Nurses' Residence. Added to these was a Bazaar in 1949. Greatly appreciated help has been given the Main Office by the ladies who have volunteered to assume charge of the Information desk during the busy visiting hours of the afternoon. Patients have been cheered by the visits of the gracious ladies, who have provided books for their entertainment. The work accomplished by the group assisting with the sewing has been a valuable contribution. Through their faithful service sufficient linen was supplied for the opening of the New Wing.

They have also furnished rooms, purchased various articles of equipment and made donations of large sums of money for hospital use.

In 1941—Our Lady of Victory Wing added a new suite of three operating rooms to the third floor and an emergency operating room near the ambulance entrance.

March 19, 1945—Inauguration of New Addition:-

The turning of the sod, to inaugurate the construction of the modern addition to St. Joseph's Hospital took place on this date, in a simple ceremony on the Feast of St. Joseph.



NEW WING—1947

May 3, 1947—Dedication of New Addition:—

Twenty-five months later, Bishop J. F. Ryan, D.D., dedicated the new addition to the charge of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

After the celebration of Mass on a temporary altar in the main foyer, this new Hospital addition, extending accommodation to 374 beds, was blessed and dedicated by His Excellency, the Most Reverend J. F. Ryan, D.D., J.C.D., Bishop of Hamilton.

Description of New Hospital:-

Viewed from John Street and Charlton Avenue, the new St. Joseph's Hospital is strikingly modern, dignified and stately in its distinctive beauty.

One of the most modern Hospital units on the Continent, the building provides a beautiful architectural face, and contains the newest operating, X-Ray and Laboratory equipment, and accommodates 191 patients in most attractive rooms.

In significant relief from the striking modern architecture of the facade, a statue of the Patron Saint of the new St. Joseph's Hospital, overlooks the parapet before the main entrance.

A feature of the plan is the Service Tower from which four Wings radiate. Located in the centre of a cross, as it were, the Service Tower allows centralization of services, leaving the wings free for bed accommodation. All services concentrate in the central tower: elevators, nurses' stations, nurses' rooms, visitors' rooms, diet kitchens, utility and storage space.

The units are as two great crosses, end to end, with the main segment parallel with John Street. Two of the wings stretch out to John Street, the other two toward the rear. It is the South-west wing which connects with the former Surgical Wing.

This Building takes in most of the block from Charlton Avenue to Mountain Boulevard. Of the two wings stretching out to John Street, the Northerly one contains the entrance lobby and administrative section.

The new Hospital has seven Operating rooms and one Recovery room located on the third floor. The X-Ray section, with provision for Physiotherapy, is adjacent to the Operating Room Suite.

The new Laboratory, twice the size of the former one, is located on the ground floor, directly under the Operating Room Suite, with dumb waiter service between.

In addition to economizing on space, the Service Towers eliminates noise in the wards. In this connection, a central Tray service was planned, with all dishwashing done in the modern central kitchen. A section of the kitchen is set aside for special diets.

Every room has a toilet room in connection with it. Every ward, private, semi-private or otherwise, has such facilities.

All sterile supplies for the floors are taken care of in a central supply room, where a complete sterilization unit is installed. The Operating Room has its own sterilization facilities.

A central linen room is provided for the making, mending, sorting and distribution of all linen. This is located in space formerly occupied by the X-Ray Department.

The Hospital is standardized by the American College of Surgeons as Grade A, according to their requirements for Department of Medicine, Surgery, Pathology, Radiology, Pharmacy, etc.

The location of the Hospital makes the training school a centre toward which pupil nurses converge from a wide area.

Two spacious visitors' waiting rooms open on either side of the immediate wide entry hall. High windows facing the East, South and North give the appearance of a spacious Sun-room.

Administrative offices occupy the Northerly Wing of this floor. Off the main lobby are the offices of the Bursar and Superior, a small Reception Room, the Board-room, the Doctors' Staff room with an "In and Out" Register, which records at the Switchboard, also the Cashier's office, the General Office, including the Inquiry and Information Service.

The up-to-date and efficient Pharmacy consists of two sections; a dispensing room and a work-room on the ground floor; a Pharmacy and Chemical room in the basement. The Hospital Pharmacy serves as a clearing-house for the latest ideas in medicine.

Admitting of patients by the Charlton Avenue entrance of St. Joseph's Hospital, as originally planned when the new wing was built, was inaugurated on Monday, April 25, 1949. This meant that all patients applied at the Admitting Office, directly inside the Charlton Avenue entrance, instead of at the John Street entrance.

This Department also contains X-Ray equipment for the examination of the chest of each patient being admitted. The Fluorographic Chest Unit opened May 19, 1949.

Immediately following admission to the Hospital, one small film is made to detect unsuspected disease. This is a survey, the purpose of which is to suggest the need for a thorough examination by standard X-Ray methods, and by the patient's own doctor when an abnormality is seen in the miniature film. Other Hospital patients and the Hospital Staff are thus protected from possible infection.

The equipment has been made available by the Division of Tuberculosis Prevention of the Ontario Department of Health. Its operation is the responsibility of St. Joseph's Hospital, and a nominal charge of one dollar is made to meet these costs.

A modern Cafeteria, at the rear of the elevators, has furniture in light wood and presents a modernistic appearance throughout. There are two dining-rooms, one very large one and a medium-sized room, where nurses, doctors and Office Staff dine together. Woven drapes are

of bright hues and lend a bright atmosphere, together with the large windows where ferns and flowers are placed to catch the sunshine.

The Paging System has been installed throughout the Hospital and can reach all wards and rooms. The intercommunicators are also a great asset for quick and urgent calls.

The Emergency Department is located on the lower floor and is equipped with an Emergency Operating room with an adjoining Recovery room, a ten-bed Emergency ward, waiting-rooms and Offices, together with Consulting rooms, Dressing and work-rooms.

The Central Surgical room, located on the lower floor, off the Emergency Department, furnishes instruments, dressings, sterile supplies, syringes to all sections of the Hospital by means of two dumb waiters, one sending out sterile supplies, the other returning used material from each ward.

Adding to the spacious appearance of the rotunda on the first, second and third floors, are the attractive nurses' stations with their dark green trim and stainless steel and red furnishings. The desks have excellent lighting and the signal system is the most modern.

Utility rooms are well-equipped. The essential untility rooms, one for the cleaning of trays and utensils the other for the reception of these after they have been celaned, are equipped with stainless steel sinks, sterilizers, refrigerators for serums and storage of blood for transfusions, and ample storage space.

The flower rooms, fitted with sinks, cupboards and shelves for vases take care of plants and flowers which are kept out of the way over night.

A bright linen room is located directly off the flower room.

The new Unit has a total bed capacity of 191 beds. The top floor, with the exception of the Operating Room and the X-Ray Suites, is reserved for private and semi-private patients.

From the semi-private rooms, one may catch a glimpse of the District surrounding either James or John Streets, extending to the mountain, while from the privte rooms, one may gaze on the beauty of the mountain or look over the City to the Bay.

These semi-private rooms are done in light walnut, harvest maple and twilight mahogany. The wards are furnished with limed oak and wheat-colored furniture. The furniture is metal, which makes it possible to keep the rooms in a sanitary condition. In keeping with the color-scheme of the furniture and drapes, the coloring of the walls vary from the palest peach to warm buff, cool green and restful blue.

In the private rooms, the decorative effects include two-tone, light walnut, two-tone green, white maple, several varieties of one-tone mahogany and rosewood.

Ample wardrobe space deserves special mention here.

Soiled linen is carried directly to the basement by the specially constructed clothes chute recessed off the corridor.

Corridors, rooms and wards are equipped with special night lights which enable the nurse to supervise the patients without disturbing their rest. Ceilings and corridors are accoustically treated to lessen the sound.

Fine Surgical Service:-

When the first operations were performed in 1890, the skill of the surgeon and the devotion of the Sisters who comprised the Nursing Staff, combined to ensure the recovery of the patient.

At this time, X-Ray had not been invented, laboratory technique was in its infancy; there was no electricity for lighting purposes, no gas or electricity for sterilizing of instruments! The latter had to be performed on an ordinary stove.

In the new Hospital, the Operating Room Suite consists of seven units on the top or third floor, besides an Emergency Operating Suite in the basement. Four of the units on the top floor Operating Suite are major, one a minor operating room; two are Tonsil rooms, ju toutside the Operating Room Suite proper.

There is a large work-room, an instrument room, and a room for sterile supplies; a six-bed Recovery room, where patients may remain until they have recovered from the effects of the anaesthetic; an office for the Supervisor of the Operating Room; outside of which is the Medical Stenographer's desk; the Doctors' Rest-room, dressing-room and shower at the beginning of the Operating Room Suite, off the main corridor; also a Nurses' rest-room and wash-room, situated outside the Operating Room Suite proper, and brick-glassed space for Anaesthetic machines and stretchers at the far end of the corridor in the Operating Room Suite.

Between each two Surgeries, there is a battery of scrub sinks, hot and cold water sterilizers, a high pressure autoclave for instruments and a blanket warmer. These are all of the recess type. A cupboard for sterile supplies and an instrument sink are also placed between each two major units. The operating rooms are fitted with the most modern adjustable operating tables.

The major rooms are furnished in soft green, with a 6 foot dado of terraza in horn-lux finish. They contain instruments cabinets with two view boxes for X-Ray films. All connections and fixtures are explosion-proof and the lights are Operay multibeam, shockproof lights. The Operating Rooms are air-conditioned.

In case of an emergency in an Operating Room, a special system permits the sterile nurse to flash a light above the door in the corridor and in the work-room. The latter contains an autoclave with a chart thermometer which records the temperature during the course of sterilization.

The two Tonsil rooms are fitted with Tonsil tables which may be adjusted to a chair position.

X-Ray Department:—

In close proximity to the Operating Room Suite, there is the X-Ray Suite, which includes the Fracture and the Cystoscopy rooms.

The entire West Wing of the top of the third floor, adjoining the Operating Room Suite, is devoted to X-Ray and Physiotherapy.

This location was considered advisable, because many X-Ray examinations are in large part surgical procedures. Cystoscopy and ureteral catheterization, in which X-Ray plays an important, if not a major role, and the reduction of fractures, are examples of the close interlocking between X-Ray and Surgical procedures.

The new Suite consists of twelve rooms, one of which is reserved for Physiotherapy. This is sub-divided into four smaller rooms, so that four cases may be treated simultaneously, under the supervision of one Physiotherapist. There is also one Orthopaedic room and one Fracture room, in which fractures may be set with fluoroscopic control.

Both of these rooms are equipped with a special plaster sink to avoid clogging of the drains with Plaster of Paris. The windows are light-proofed so that fluoroscopy may be performed satisfactorily. The dark-room is centrally located with a maze entrance.

There are two main X-Ray machines, one operating on 25 cycle and the other on 60 cycle current, which is deemed preferable.

A special room for X-Ray of the urinary tract may also be darkened to permit the Operating Surgeon to inspect the bladder through a telescopic tube carrying a tiny lamp at the tip. In order to make X-Ray films which show the exact outline of the interior of the kidney, flexible tubes are passed upwards to the kidneys, and an injection passed through. Chest X-Rays are made with stereoscope which reveals all chest structures in three dimensions.

Another feature of the X-Ray service is the mobile unit which may be moved at need to any part of the Hosiptal. This provides X-Ray examinations for those patients who cannot safely be moved to the X-Ray Department.

An important safety device is the auxiliary 60 cycle electric service which is installed in the corridors, operating rooms and exits, so that at no time is there danger of the Hospital being plunged into total darkness through power failure.

Kitchen:---

In the South section of the main floor is the Kitchen, equipped with every modern device to facilitate labor and give the most efficient service possible. This Kitchen is one integral whole, with specially fitted sections, each a unit in itself. It has been designed to provide central tray service.

New Laundry Building-1949:-

In the rear of the Hospital proper, is the very modern Laundry Building which cost in the neighbourhood of \$132,000.00 to build, the machinery alone costing \$34,000.00.

A tunnel connects this Laundry Building with the Hospital and an elevator service is installed here.

On December 13th, this new Building was first opened and put into full operation. It is well-ventilated, having modern air-conditioning throughout and represents the most modern design in laundry building.

The walls inside are natural buff-colored tile, with pale green woodwork, and the floors are of terraza.

The Laundry is not only very practical and sanitary, but is a pleasant place in which to work.

St. Joseph's has not stayed behind in the question of equipment, but has kept apace the times. From time to time obsolete machines have been replaced by more modern ones and when the opportunity presented itself of building this beautiful modern structure, after thorough investigation, it was decided to install the very latest labor-saving Laundry equipment available.

Therefore, in the wash-room, all motor-driven Monel Metal "Cascade" washers have been installed with motor-driven extractors also of Monel Metal.

One washer, the "Cascade" unloading washer with the full automatic washing control is not only the very latest equipment of its kind, but the first in Canada!

Another unique piece of equipment is the new Sylon flatwork Ironer with ventilating canopy. This machine is motor-driven.

This Laundry is equipped with machinery, that will produce work with the highest efficiency at the lowest cost. Bath towels, bed-spreads, etc., are all fluff-dried in the Zone Air Drying tumblers.

The erection of the four-floor unit on the South side had to be postponed, due to lack of funds.

Owing to the great demand for beds, the original plan of converting the Surgical Wing, erected in 1916, into an 80-bed Maternity Wing, had to be given up. These three floors at present are used for Medical cases.

The former Operating Room Suite has been converted into a 33-bed Children's Wing for which a grant of \$9,000.00 was received from the Provincial Government. A grant of \$177,000.00 from the Provincial Government was received by the Hospital for the erection of the Wing completed in 1947.

In the building up of the Institution the Sisters were loyally supported by their good friends in the Medical Profession, in the early years by the late Drs. IN 1949:-

After much consideration it was decided to build a new Maternity Building instead of completing the addition on the South side, which will be built at a later date.

New Maternity Wing:-

On December 8, 1949, the first sod was turned by Monsignor, the Right Reverend G. L. Cassidy, representing Bishop Ryan, for the new Maternity Wing to be built in an "L" shape around the present Casa Marie.


This Building will consist of eighty Maternity beds, and 93 Basinettes. This will bring the total Hospital accommodation nearer the 500 mark.

This new Maternity Wing is to carry out the Service Tower plan estabilshed in erecting the present Hospital. Still later additions will fit the master plan.

On the top floor of this new Maternity Wing Hospital, there will be three Operating Rooms and thirty-four Gynaecological beds, making a total of 114 beds. The building will be connected at the stairway to the 1947 addition. The main entrance will be from Charlton Avenue.

The grant to be received for this Building will be \$145,000.00 from the Provincial Government and the same amount from the Federal Government.

The progress that St. Joseph's Hospital has made throughout the past half century is an evidence of the unflagging zeal and indefatigable labor of those Sisters, who, in the different departments of the Institute, gave their best efforts without thought of earthly reward, but solely for the honor of God, in attending the sick confided to their care.

Saint Joseph's School of Nursing

Since the opening of St. Joseph's Hospital in 1890, under the capable direction of Mother Phillip and her assistants, nursing has undergone many changes. In those days the hospital possessed few labour saving devices. After a day devoted to the care of the sick, the Sisters were obliged to do much of the manual labour required to maintain the perfect sanitary condition they insisted upon in all departments of the hospital. No personal sacrifice was felt too great for these pioneer Sisters to whom is due, in a large measure, the success of those who followed in their footsteps.

In 1911, however, the growth of the hospital led the Sisters into the decision of opening a school for lay nurses. The hospital was now staffed with Sisters who had received their training under Sisters Martina and Leo, who had gone to Mercy Hospital, Kalamazoo, Michigan, and had returned to open a training school in Guelph. So numerous were the applications to the course in that hospital, that it was possible to refer some of the candidates to Hamilton.

September 8th of that year, the feast of the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, saw the first students enrolled. They were Sister M. Gerard, at present on the staff of the hospital, and Miss Ada Egan, now Mrs. Lawrence Glassco. Seven more young ladies followed at intervals. The nurses' home was the Adam Brown residence at the termination of Alma Avenue, the site of the present Undermount residence.

Their uniform, the traditional blue and white, was identical with that of to-day, with the exception of the collar, and of course, the other modifications necessary to befit the times. All uniforms were made at home, according to specifications. The cap of the school was given as soon as the probationer was deemed worthy of it, and needless to say the coveted award was often won in six weeks. The hours of duty were long, but having that true spirit of service to others, upon which nursing was based, they felt the one hour off duty permitted for rest and recreation, was a privilege. The weekly half day commenced at 3.00 p.m. if the duties were completed. Commencing with the 2nd year this half day was extended to 1.00 p.m. All lectures were given at night when both doctors and nurses were free, and the Sisters and nurses feel indebted to their good and faithful friends in the medical profession, namely Doctors Balfe, Olmstead, Edgar and Sullivan, for the laying of the foundation stones of our school.

The association between the nurses and the Sisters on the staff of the hospital was a close and happy one.

January 22nd, 1915, found the first group of nurses ready for graduation. Instead of the sunny sky, green grass and many flowers, so in keeping with graduation, the ground was covered with a great white blanket. The impressive and elaborate ceremony took place at 8.00 p.m. in the lecture hall amidst prominent members of the Hamilton clergy, laity and medical profession, who, together with friends and relatives, enjoyed the musical programme prepared by the nine young ladies themselves. Chester L. Walters, then Mayor of Hamilton, gave an inspiring address. It is interesting to note that Mr. Walters was also

the speaker at the graduation exercises of 1947. Dr. T. H. Balfe spoke on behalf of the medical profession, as did Dr. James Roberts, M.H.O., who took such a kindly interest in St. Joseph's Hospital. A handsomely engraved medal, given for outstanding work, was presented by none other than our Dr. H. J. Sullivan of to-day. Huge bouquets of pink roses, the gift of Miss Ina Larkin, were presented to the nurses, whose

names were as follows: Ada Egan, Dunnville; Ella Kelly, Mount Forest; Angela Halloran, Butte, Montana; Helen Carroll, St. Catharines; Clara Grant, Toronto; Anne Maloney, Lillian Furrey, Jean Morin, of Hamilton, and Margaret Hamilton, of Guelph. When questioned now as to the social activities following the exercises, two members of the original class, Misses Kelly and Maloney, reply with a twinkle in their eyes: "We returned to duty and to our patients."

Recreation Time—1917

In 1920 plans were begun by the Ontario Government, like the other Provincial legislatures, to enact a registration law, requiring all students to write departmental examinations on the completion of their course. This was the signal for extensive improvements in all schools that hoped to be accredited. In 1920 work commenced on the Undermount residence, which was opened in 1922. This building was erected under the direction of Mother M. Thecla and Sister St. Basil. The Sisters of St. Joseph retain a grateful memory of the co-operation which the City Council, and the citizens of Hamilton, particularly Mr. F. Radigan, showed them on this occasion. The student enrollment at this time numbered 50. The residence was built to accommodate 100, with an up-to-date teaching unit, libraries and reception room.

Since the opening of the school in 1911, 1100 nurses have passed through its doors. Of this number 790 have graduated, 25 have returned to their Maker, 145 sought other fields before the completion of the course, and 165 remain to be moulded in the great pattern of St. Joseph's. Graduates of the School are found in far off Arabia, India, Germany, Venzuela, the Philippine and Hawaian Islands, every state of the Union and Province of Canada. We are proud of our graduates and of their achievements, of their success on the battlefield in World Wars I and II, of their work in the footsteps of Him who called them to His service, in the classroom, and at the bedside of the sick and dying, not forgetting those who entered the marriage state, and are now directing their daughters to their Alma Mater.

Ballantyne for his patience and skill in teaching Bacteriology since 1929; to Dr. Lang for teaching Anatomy and Physiology; to Dr. W. A. Weaver who has continued in this subject since 1930, and to Dr. R. J. Fraser who assisted Dr. Weaver so faithfully at varying intervals; to Drs. W. Jamieson and A. Hollinrake for teaching Gynaecology; Drs. W. A. Stevenson, K. Murray and F. Hamilton in Surgery; Drs. H. Sullivan, A. Cauley, F. Johnson and A. Pain in

No page of the school's history could be complete without special mention of Dr. L. L. Playfair, who for so many years took a fatherly interest in the students. Although he now makes his home in a land other than Canada, his much loved name appears on the programme each year for the award in General Proficiency.

Special note may be made here of the award given each year since the first graduation exercises by Dr. H. J. Sullivan, and that given by Dr. John R. Parry for so many years. We offer them our deepest appreciation for their kindly interest.

THE ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL ALUMNAE

The St. Joseph's Hospital Alumnae was organized in 1915 under the convenership of Misses Ada Egan and Jean Morin, assisted by the Sisters on the staff of the hospital.

The first graduation had taken place earlier in the year, and a definite need was felt for more unity among the young nurses who were leaving the shelter of the hospital, and taking their place among the women of the world. Mother Helen was Superior of the hospital at

this time and Sister St. Basil Superintendent of Nurses. Sister Joseph was in charge of the Operating room. The ward and department supervisors were: Sisters M. Everista, M. Angelica, M. Vincent, M. Loretto and M. Consilli. Sister M. Mildred was dietitian. After much planning and formulating of Constitutions and by-laws the nucleus of the present association was formed, with Miss Ella Kelly as President.

In 1920, in anticipation of the erection of the new residence, the nurses planned to raise \$1000.00 to assist in furnishing the living-room. Ways and means were discussed as to raising this amount of money. There were now forty-nine graduates. The then mountainous sum of \$1000.00 was quickly raised by private donations of from \$5.00 to \$20.00 from the graduates themselves. To many of us to-day we wonder just how this could be done, when the rate for private duty, which was then the only field open to nurses, was \$3.50 for 12 hour duty. To complete their goal they held a dance at the Connaught Hotel, thereby completing their objective.

In 1923 a request for linen was launched, and again the nurses gave individual donations of from \$5.00 to \$10.00.

In 1925 a chalice was presented to a Mission in Western Canada. Linen was purchased by the Alumnae, and the Sisters made and embroidered Altar linens, which were sent to the Mission.

In 1928, when Miss Lahiff, a graduate of 1917, was very ill, the nurses procured a hospital bed from the Sisters, for use in her home. Miss Lahiff passed away after several months' illness, never forgetting the kindliness of her companions.

In 1934 a Maniken was presented to the classroom. In 1936 a donation was given towards the building fund of the Cathedral of Christ the King.

It would be difficult to enumerate the good work done by the Alumnae. With the opening of the new wing in the hospital in 1948 they gave a cash donation of \$1000.00. Each year they present a Scholarship, valued at \$500.00 in Nursing education, to some worthy student of the graduating class. This, with a similar one donated by the St. Joseph's Hospital Auxiliary, have kept our School staffed with highly qualified personnel. Donations have been given to the library fund, for furniture for the lawn and other items so numerous it would be impossible to mention in these few pages. May God reward them for their good work.
