

Our Lady's Hospital 1928-1988

The 60th anniversary of the Vilna Hospital is indeed something to celebrate! It is also a time to express profound gratitude to God and to all who have shared in building up these fine health facilities.

It was the far-sightedness and persuasiveness of Monsignor Hughes that led to the founding of the hospital in the Village of Vilna. It was he who convinced His Excellency, H.J. O'Leary and Reverend G.D. Daly, C.Ss.R., of the need for this hospital to be located in this area.

The beginnings were like the mustard seed, barely visible to the eye. The first little hospital was opened in the old bank building on the east side of Main Street, on November 10, 1925. The first three Sisters of Service who came to Vilna where Sisters Catherine Wymbs, Ann Gerghty and Mary Rodgers.

At that time there was no permanent doctor living in the village. Doctor Morish of Smoky Lake offered his services until a permanent doctor could be found. It was in May, 1926, that Doctor Eadie became the first resident general practitioner of Vilna. He remained in Vilna until 1941. Again Vilna was without a resident doctor. However, Doctors Svarich, Dobson, Bergman and Thomas from Smoky Lake attended to the sick of Vilna. These men of mercy travelled back and forth on rough roads to provide this valuable service.

It was a great day, in 1946, when Doctor P.W. Frobb, M.D., set up his practice in Vilna.

Humble and primitive were the beginnings of the first hospital built by the Sisters of Service at a cost of \$25,000.00 (an enormous sum of money at that time)! This modern, fully equipped hospital was officially opened in December, 1928.

There was no running water or electricity. The maintenance man had to keep a watchful eye on the batteries in the plant. When the plant failed, the Sisters had to scurry around for coal-oil lamps to minister to the patients. A well had to be found and sewage established. Those were interesting days in construction: everything had to begin at the very beginning.

A physical structure is just so much brick, mortar and wood put together to form a building. It was the dedication of the Sisters of Service, the doctors and all who had helped them who breathed life, compassion and love, which truly counts, into the structure. That is the seed from which your health care facility of today grew.

No one can be content with yesterday's glories. The tradition of patient care established by the Sisters of Service, the doctors and staff is continuing to this day. The Boards of Directors have, despite great obstacles, kept this tradition alive. The citizens of Vilna have done their part and the Alberta Government has provided this beautiful building which will continue to serve the people of Vilna and District in this time-honored tradition.

The Sisters are happy to know that the people in Vilna and area are well taken care of in the new building and by our successors.




AUXILIARY AT BAKE TABLE ANNUAL STRAWBERRY TEA - 1988.





X-RAY MACHINE - In old hospital, collectors' piece, not in present use.













