


COAT OF ARMS OF THE SISTERS OF ST. ELIZABETH OF THE THIRD ORDER REGULAR OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

As shown on the ancient coat of the Franciscan Order we see the crossed arms of Christ and St. Francis. The wound of the nails is displayed in the palms of both our Saviour and the Seraph of Assisi, in token of the stigmata which the latter was privileged to carry. Surmounting all is the Cross, recalling the words of St. Paul so frequently used by St. Francis: "God forbid that I should glory, save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." The roses on the lower part of the crest symbolize the works of charity of St. Elizabeth of Hungary. The crown above the cross represents the regal crown of this illustrious princess of charity and glory of the Franciscan Order.










Back Through History

In 1710 the Sisters of Graz founded a convent and hospital at Klagenfurt, Austria.

The Sisters of St. Elizabeth at Klagenfurt, Austria, celebrated their two hundredth anniversary in 1910, and expressed their wish to begin a new foundation Pioneer group in a mission territory.

On May 17, 1911, three sisters arrived at Muenster, Saskatchewan and established a Motherhouse and Hospital at Humboldt.



The Sisters of St. Elizabeth Motherhouse and Hospital at Humboldt

As pioneers in Saskatchewan the Sisters of St. Elizabeth of Humboldt established other dependent houses. One of these is St. Michael's Hospital at Cudworth.

Sisters Euphrasia Weiss and Benedicta Yungwirth came to Cudworth on December 9, 1924. They cared for the sick in temporary rented quarters where Dr. Longault had already established a health care unit. This house was destroyed by fire in 1925.

The hospital conveniently accommodated twenty-four patients. It was blessed by Rev. Casimir Cismowski. He served as chaplain until his death in 1940. The hospital was officially opened on December 17, 1926, and solemnly blessed the following May, by Rt. Rev. Abbot Severin Gertken, OSB.

Seven sisters from Humboldt provided the services and care. Dr. J.A. McDonald and Dr. A.G. Genereux were among the pioneers as the active medical staff. They were followed by Dr. Kershaw and Dr. H.M. Bigelow. The Hospital continued to up-date and the grounds were developed and landscaped.

When the old building became obsolete it was replaced by the present modern one-storey structure, which in 1973 became a fully accredited hospital and continues to serve Cudworth and the surrounding areas.

The St. Michael's Hospital continues to be owned and operated by the Sisters of St. Elizabeth whose present administrative headquarters is 1020 College Drive, Saskatoon, Saskatchewan.

In 1961 the sisters obtained separate incorporation for the St. Michael's Hospital. (Bill No. 05 pf 1961)

ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPITAL OBSERVES SILVER JUBILEE (Prairie Messenger — June 1951)

CUDWORTH, Sask. - Although the twenty-fifth anniversary of the blessing of St. Michael's Hospital, here, fell on May 29th, the silver jubilee celebration was postponed until Sunday, June 1. The day opened with a solemn High Mass sung by Very Rev. Peter, O.S.B., Prior of St. Peter's Abbey, Muenster, assisted by Fr. Florian of Muenster as deacon, Fr. Edward, pastor, as subdeacon, and Mr. Francis Kolla as master of ceremonies.

Taking as his text the words of the Gospel, "If anyone love me, he will keep my commandments, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our abode with him" (John 14:23), Fr. Prior in the festive sermon invited the congregation to study well the five chapters 13-17 in St. John's Gospel.

They contain the last admonitions of Christ before His passion, the commandment of the love symbolized in the Holy Eucharist, and the promise of the coming of the Holy Ghost. The Holy Ghost, too, must have been operative twenty-five years ago, he said, inspiring the building of the hospital, the doctors and staff, to encourage them to undertake its building, and the people for supporting it so well.

At 3:00 p.m. a large crowd, perhaps the largest ever to assemble for a hospital day in Cudworth, gathered in the spacious parking space in front of the hospital. The program opened with the singing of "O Canada" by the St. Michael's Church Choir. The Choir continued to sing hymns while Fr. Prior blessed the statue of the Blessed Virgin, donated by Dr. J.H. Schropp and erected in the new park north of the Hospital.

Mr. J.M. Wiebe, chairman of the gathering, introduced the vocal soloists
Colette Kohle, "Bless This House", Rita
Kohle, "Our Lady of Fatima", and the duet
by Ella Lange and Mrs. Johnson, "Ave Maria".
The accompanist was Shirley Wiebe.

Mr. J. E. Robinson of the Department of Public Health spoke briefly of his pleasure at the sight of such whole hearted support of a local hospital. He congratulated the staff of the hospital on the excellent work they were doing.

Fr. Florian briefly reviewed the history of the hospital from the time the first sod was broken on June 16, 1926, to the present. He said that those of the present can take their cue from the people of the past who were responsible for its erection and maintenance. The hospital ought to be given support and cooperation it deserves for all the good it has done to

the town and district.

From 1926 to 1970 the Sisters of St. Elizabeth governed St. Michael's Hospital. An Advisory Board composed of interested people from the community assisted the sisters during these years especially in financial concerns.

With the introduction of Hospital and Medical Care insurance and the greater use of public funds, the hospital became a complex organization . The Sisters therefore reorganized the Board to include lay people. The Board of Directors of St. Michael's Hospital is composed of four sisters and four lay representatives of Cudworth and the surrounding municipalities and villages.

The Board holds an Annual Meeting which is open to the Public. Reports of all areas of hospital administration and finance are reviewed by the local community. The Board appreciates the devotion, time and effort of all who serve the people at St. Michael's Hospital. St. Michael's Hospital achieved Provisional Accreditation Status in 1973 and Full Accreditation in 1974.

ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPITAL AT CUDWORTH SASKATCHEWAN (C.H.A.C. Vol. 7, No.7, May 30, 1965)

St. Michael's, a new hospital costing \$440,000, was officially opened on May 30 this year at Cudworth, Saskatchewan.

The public was welcomed by Mayor A.H. Wunderlich and following the singing of "O Canada", the invocation was given by Reverend Father Alfred, pastor of St. Michael's parish.

In his opening remarks, Mr. T. Nieman, master of ceremonies, acknowledged the letters and greetings which had been received by the hospital staff and board.

Greetings from Premier P. Thatcher and Mr. D. Stuart, Minister of Public Health, were brought by Mr. Percy Hunt, Assistant Director of Hospital Administration and Standards of the Department of Public Health.

Mr. Hunt, in his talk, said the new hospital at Cudworth was another example of the interest of the Order of the Sisters of St. Elizabeth in hospital work. He pointed out that the Order had been active in Saskatchewan since 1911 when it started a hospital at Humboldt and 15 years later established hospitals at Macklin and Cudworth.

Others who spoke briefly were Dr. M. Waldron, Indian Health Services Branch of the Department of National Health and Welfare; Mr. W. Holtby, President of the Saskatchewan Hospital Association; Mr. D. Wassill of Humboldt for the Catholic Hospital Conference of Saskatchewan; Miss Linda Long of Regina for the Saskatchewan Registered Nurses' Assoc.; Mr. R. Schneider of Prince Albert as Co-ordinator for the North Central Regional Hospital Council; Mr. H. Broten, M.L.A. and Mr. A. Thibault, M.L.A.

Features of the opening ceremonies were presentations of gifts to the hospital. These included a cheque of \$60,000.00 by Mr. T. Nieman on behalf of the community of Cudworth obtained through the efforts of the Lay Advisory Board of St. Michael's Hospital;





a \$10,000,00 cheque by Mrs. T. Dierker on behalf of the St. Michael's Hospital Women's Auxiliary; a \$100.00 cheque by Miss D. Frey on behalf of the Roman Catholic Youth Club and a \$900.00 cheque from Old St. Benedict Parish for furnishing a semi-private room

Following these presentations Mr. B. Schwinghammer, Wells Construction Co., presented the key of the hospital to Mr. W. Kelly, of Webster, Forrester and Scott, Architects. Mr. W. Kelly then presented the key to Mr. T. Nieman, Chairman of the Lay Advisory Board, who in turn presented it to Sister M. Hildegard, Administrator. Sister M. Hildegard then unlocked the door and escorted the visitors into the hospital.


Laboratory



ACCREDITED HOSPITAL



Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation

A voluntary program of hospital accreditation is operated by a body known as the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation. Representatives from National Hospital and Medical Associations form the membership of the Council. The Saskatchewan Hospital Association through its affiliation with the Canadian Hospital Association participates in the Council and represents Saskatchewan Hospitals. Accreditation indicates that the Hospitals' standards meet recognized requirements as applied to hospitals across Canada. Standards are outlined in the Accreditation Guide Book obtainable from the Council Office, Toronto.

Accreditation status normally is granted to a hospital by the Council for a period of three years, following which a further survey is required to obtain re-accreditation. Occasionally however, the Council may grant provisional accreditation status to a hospital for a one year period only, during which the hospital is required to upgrade its services in specific areas identified by the accreditation survey.

St. Michael's Hospital received provisional accreditation in 1973 and full accreditation in 1974.

ST. MICHAEL'S HOSPITAL AUXILIARY



The St. Michael's Hospital Auxiliary dates back to about 1933, when a "Hospital Guild" was organized. Unfortunately the record of minutes and financial reports prior to 1960 have been lost. Only a minimum of information has been made available from the Provincial Archives.

The Auxiliary of St. Michael's received a 25th Anniversary Certificate from the Provincial Auxiliaries in 1973. This shows that the Auxiliary was affiliated with the Provincial Auxiliaries since 1948. The name, Hospital Guild, was changed to St. Michael's Hospital Auxiliary in 1962. In 1963 the Auxiliary adopted a Constitution.

During the 30's and 40's the Hospital Guild averaged about sixty members. Gradually membership increased and in 1975 there were 157 paid-up members.

An annual membership fee of twenty-five cents was collected prior to 1969. Then the fee became one dollar for five years. Since 1973 the fee is one dollar for three years.

Ask any auxiliary at Cudworth and District, "What does Hospital Auxiliary mean?" The reply will doubtless be, "It means family lunches, bingo, raffles, and a tour of the hospital on hospital day." Another may add, "A Fall Tea and Raffle". Until 1967 the answer would have included, "An Annual Dance and Supper."

The Auxiliary at St. Michael's believes in being involved and active. They take pride in their hospital and know what is needed. No project is too difficult if it brings returns, and the Auxiliary know how to do it.

Any woman may join the Auxiliary. There are only a few meetings each year. Two annual delights are a summer lawn party and the Christmas Tree celebration with the sisters.

Auxiliary Activities


At the old two-storey building on the hill, the one built in 1926, Hospital Day meant large crowds. There were tea and sandwiches, bingo and raffles in the basement near the kitchen. People could observe how food was sent to the patients' rooms on a "dumbwaiter."

Raffles were held at least twice a year and sometimes more frequently.

Imagine a lady from town borrowing the family car, back in the thirties and forties, and driving from farm to farm collecting cream, goose feathers and chickens to be used at the tea, raffle and auction on Hospital Day.



Some will recall how a group of ladies, under the able leadership of Mrs. August Diedrichs, diligently fabricated a quilt to be raffled on Hospital Day.



In 1949 the Guild netted \$400.00.

In each year from 1963-65, more than \$1,000.00 was cleared. During these years special projects were tried with the added incentive of providing help to the New Hospital which opened in 1965.

In 1975 Hospital Day brought a neat sum of \$942.00. A sincere thank you to all individuals, local businessmen and all organizations for their annual donations of prizes and gifts.

The pioneer Auxiliary members remember the Hospital Guild for its annual Fall Dance which was one of the few times when everyone, including young single ladies, paid their way. Wedding dances were free, at that time.



Auxiliary Activities

Income recorded from dances was as follows:

November the 4th, 1947 - \$100.00.

Income in 1957 was only \$68.00. In 1958, the Guild sponsored a bazaar with cold plates served at the old town hall. \$300.00 were cleared.

In 1962 the bazaar netted \$869.00. In 1963 and '65 the bazaars cleared \$1187.00 and \$1104.00 respectively.

From this can be seen why the dance was discontinued.

In 1963 the Auxiliary were asked to sponsor a \$5.00 plate, hot meal, served at long tables in the skating rink. All the profits were for the new hospital. The Auxiliary presented a total of \$10,000.00 toward the new hospital in 1963.

Other activities include a Nuts and Candy Sale in 1965 - \$125.00

Bedspread raffle and Valentine Sale 1965 - \$225.00 Lunches at 4H-Day 1966

A centennial Day booth and float in the parade in 1967.





The Auxiliary started a catering service at public functions in 1967. There were the Lion's Supper of 1967, K of C Ball in '74 and weddings from 1970 onwards, with Mrs. Cathryn Renneberg as catering convenor.

The gift bar at the hospital was started in 1963 and a pop machine installed. The auxiliary donate articles to the gift bar and maintain the pop vendor.

Contributions from the auxiliary provide books and subscriptions for the patients' library. In 1974 a library case was donated to the hospital for the patients' library.

The Auxiliary made it possible for the Hospital to purchase the following supplies and equipment.

During the 30's and 40's smaller items like mattresses, lamps, refrigerators, suction pump, woolen blankets, curtains and floor coverings were purchased.

- #300.00 for a refrigerator for patients' juices and for baby formulae.
- 1949-50 #370.00 for various items as: Delivery room lamp \$200.00; humidifiers \$76.00; Oxygen tent; mixmaster \$46.00; living room furniture for the new employee residence for \$100.00.
- 1954 Furniture and bedding
- 1955 New cooking stove for \$824.00
- 1956 Electrocardiograph \$1,370.00; delivery room window, toys, games, magazines, bedlamps
- 1958 Basal metabolism machine, X-ray, large lamps, New Year's baby spoon.
- 1959 Set of new dishes \$100.00; furniture for a private room \$400.00.
- 1960 Microscope for lab \$700.00 and woolen blankets.
- 1961 Floor polisher
- 1962 Oxygen tent and matresses
- 1964 Diathermy machine \$985.60
- 1965 \$10,000.00 to furnish the maternity ward, nursery and delivery room of the new hospital.
- Toys for small patients and a record player \$146.50; Boardroom furniture including davenport and chair \$934.00; other chairs \$300.00; tables \$250.00.
- Oxygen croupette for children's ward; baby scale \$31.00; an apparatus for the operating room \$250.00; signs for patients' beds \$185.00; clothes racks \$57.50; Chapel organ \$597.00; Buffet for dining room \$150.00; coffee urn \$54.00; typewriter \$200.00. To commemorate Canada Centennial year, we planted a weeping birch on the hospital grounds.
- 1968 Outdoor railing on front stairs \$375.00; x-ray \$96.72.
- \$1,000.00 from Auxiliary rink canteen to Cudworth Nursing home; \$700.00 for equipment for the hospital; and \$185.00 for a second croupette.
- 1970 Wall clock for the boardroom; \$1,200.00 for an anesthetic table, cold steamers, safety rails for beds, instruments for operating room, utility cart, boardroom cupboards.
- 1971 Radio, heart monitor for \$1,500.00.
- 1972 Six flower vases \$6.26 and the balance for the monitor \$738.00
- 1973 Projector and films \$78.35; gift bar case \$300.00; cassette tape recorder \$42.47; mobiles for children's
- \$1,000.00 for the Ambulance; \$288.00 for library case; \$500.00 for ambulance garage.
- 1975 \$500.00 for Ambulance maintenance.

Auxiliary Activities

During the 50's and 60's meetings were held in private homes with the ladies alternating as hostess and co-hostess. There were four meetings annually. The present Constitution requires six regular meetings a year. They are held in the Hospital Board Room.

A general ring which cost \$1.00 was used to notify members of the meetings. Today we have a phoning committee.

Another interesting and worthwhile venture of the Auxiliary was the organization of the Candystripers called "Michaelettes" at our Hospital. These young people come to the hospital after school, Saturdays, Sundays and on public holidays to receive instructions and assist in various activities such as reading to patients, feeding children, serving trays and performing small errands. They socialize with the patients and play with the children. Michaelettes must be 15 years of age. Approximately 10 to 15 girls take the course each year.

The Auxiliary offers a \$25.00 scholarship to nursing graduates and a grade X proficiency award each year. Names and applications must be sent to the Auxiliary.

Each year several ladies attend the District #5 Auxiliary Meeting and the Fall Provincial Auxiliary Convention which is held in Saskatoon or Regina.

The Cudworth Auxiliary hosted the District #5 meetings in 1958, 1963, 1968, and 1975.

In 1971 they hosted a combined Hospital Auxiliary and Nursing Home Workshop.



Auxiliary Activities

In 1975 the Cudworth Auxiliary prepared two skits to provide entertainment at the District #5 Meeting. The entertainment was so well received that the group were invited to entertain the National Auxiliary Convention in Saskatoon the same year.

The Auxiliary collect the gifts of the town for the New Year's baby born at St. The Auxiliary Michael's. has made small contributions to the International Alliance of Hospital Volunteers to aid a hospital in Malaysia. In 1969 the New Nursing Home was opened. The Auxiliary participated in the Nursing Home Friendship Club.

The above is a brief summary of Auxiliary activities.


VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

The course is conducted by a registered nurse as instructor, and organized by the administrator.

The duties of the Junior Volunteer workers are non-nursing duties. Some of the restrictions and the requirements which would appear to be almost mandatory are: Teenagers are not assigned duties which require the exercise of mature judgment or place too great a responsibility on young shoulders. volunteers are never to participate in medication and treatment of patients.
