HISTORY OF

SAINT JOSEPH'S GENERAL HOSPITAL SCHOOL OF NURSING

Two Evangelical counsels: "I have compassion on the multitude", and "what you do for one of the least important brothers of mine, you do for me", gave birth in 1682 to a nursing and teaching religious order, the Sisters of Charity of Our Lady of Evron. Madame Perrine Brunet Thulard, a young widow, who resided in the small country parish of la Chapelle - au - Riboul, France, responded to the needs of the era and founded an institution which had a double mission of charity - the education of children belonging to the poorer class and the care of the destitute sick.

It was this same spirit of charity and devotion which prompted eight Sisters of Charity of Our Lady of Evron to leave their beloved homeland and come to Trochu, Alberta, in 1909 to take up the work of caring for the sick and teaching the children in this small rural community.

Some fourteen months later two of these first eight sisters, Sister Marie Victoire Bruhay and Sister Josephine Boisseau along with two other sisters newly arrived from France, Sister Marie Louise Martigne and Sister Marie Doisneau came to Vegreville to establish and staff a hospital.

The Sisters were met at the C.N.R. Station by Dr. A. Couillard and Reverend Father Bernier.

The two priests in charge of the Parish, Father Bernier and Father Garnier, found temporary accommodation elsewhere and left the rectory to be used by the Sisters. It was in this building that patients were first received and cared for.


The kind Sisters of Providence of St. Brieux, who were already established in the locality, offered their cordial hospitality to the Sisters of Charity while the rectory was being suitably furnished.

The construction of a hospital was undertaken during 1911 and finally in October of that year a 36 X 90 foot building was dedicated and

officially opened. Three doctors, Dr. A. Couillard, Dr. C. Field, and Dr. H. Monkman, attended the sick who were admitted to the hospital.

In 1912, Sister Marie Francoise Jouin replaced Sister Marie Victoire Bruhay as administrator of the establishment. The rapidly increasing number of patients requiring hospital care caused some concern as staff was limited. Sister Marie Francoise thought of establishing a training program for nurses and in 1915 a nursing school was started under the capable direction of Sister Josephine Boisseau.

The same year Sister Maria Foucher received her diploma, signed by Dr. Belanger. She was the first graduate nurse from this hospital.

A few years later the school was officially recognized and approved by the provincial authorities. The establishment of the school was a real impetus to constantly improve standards of patient care.

The first Graduation exercise took place on Sept. 20, 1918, with Miss J. M. McDougall (lt.) and Miss C. Forde (rt.) receiving their diplomas. In 1916 a definite uniform of the School was adopted. It consisted of a blue dress with white apron, cuffs and cap. Except for minor changes it remained the uniform of the school until 1963.

Semper Fidelis became the School's motto. School colors were yellow, mauve and white; these being changed to green and gold in 1947.

In 1922 a little cottage, formerly used as an Isolation Hospital, was transformed into a "Home" for student nurses. This small home was vacated only in 1959 after the construction of the New Residence. The school became better organized; regulations were enforced and doctors started to give lectures.




In 1933, a new wing (Dept. C.) was added to the hospital. In all, there were 50 beds and 10 bassinets at this time.

- The First Hospital Day


- The 25th anniversary of the School of Nursing. Eighty students had graduated from the school during the past 25 yrs.

1943 saw some improvements around the Nurses' Residence:

- Under the supervision of Sr. Cecilia the landscaping took on a new charm.
- The basement was remodelled and made more attractive for the benefit of the students.

- The Ladies' Auxiliary donated a motion picture projector for the School.

Three other highlights of 1943 were:

- Students were permitted to wear white shoes and stockings instead of the black.
- A gold proficiency medal was awarded at Graduation time.
- The Gay Hearts was organized.

In April the Vermilion River overflowed and left the Hospital and Residence in a small lake. The Nurses moved to the hospital for one week. The only method of transportation was by boat.

45th Anniversary of the School of Nursing


Wednesday, May 4, 1960, marked the golden anniversary of St. Joseph's General Hospital and the official opening of the New Residence. The Eucharistic celebration was officiated at by His Grace, Archbishop J.H. MacDonald.

A banquet chaired by Mr. Fred Laing was held at noon and several speakers offered congratulations to the Sisters of Charity for their devoted service to the community.

The same day, the Alumnae Association held a reunion which included a tea, tour of the new residence, and a banquet. At the banquet, chaired by Mrs. Sophie Triska, Sister Madeleine officially welcomed the grads back home and extended a hearty invitation to one and all to visit their Alma Mater whenever the time and inclination presented itself. Sister Helen, administrator, gave a brief resume of the whereabouts of the nursing sisters who had worked or studied in St. J.G.H. Mrs. Stan Walker spoke on the present day trends in nursing, after which Miss A. Jacula ably and efficiently traced the progress of the school from its inception in 1915 until 1960, mentioning that a total of 265 nurses had graduated.



In conclusion Miss Jacula stressed the endless debt that each of the Alumnae members owe to the Sisters for their tireless efforts on our behalf as we strove to attain our goals in nursing.



The year 1959 saw some major changes in the affiliation program. The class who had entered the school in the fall of 1958 left together in the fall of 1959 to begin an extended affiliation program at the Edmonton General Hospital. Miss Ruth Zeller, who was at that time an instructor in the school, accompanied the students and acted as a co-ordinator of the program. This affiliation included lectures and experience in medical, surgical and pediatric nursing. The students were to receive their experience in psychiatric nursing during the time that they would be absent from the home school. The Provincial Hospital, Edmonton, began about this time to receive student nurses for affiliation, and some of the members of class 1958 took their psychiatric affiliation at Oliver, while others took theirs at Alberta Hospital, Ponoka. After the year 1960 all of the Vegreville students took their psychiatric nursing experience at Alberta Hospital, Edmonton.







During the year 1960, an affiliation program contract was drawn up with the Royal Alexandra Hospital in Edmonton, and in autumn of the same year, students who had commenced training in 1959, began their affiliation program in pediatric, emergency, medical and surgical nursing at R.A.H. The basic program saw minor changes from time to time allowing for additional experience in certain areas such as intensive care and some of the specialties.

During the sixties the students were put on a forty hour week and were also given additional privileges such as sleep outs, and the much desired honor system in their senior year.

1963 saw the last capping ceremony and the class who entered the school in 1964 received their caps with their uniforms. One couldn't refer to the beginners as "probies" anymore as they really looked like "professionals" from the day they received their uniforms.





THE STORY OF THE UNIFORM

In 1915-students wore ordinary dresses and

went on duty the first day of training.

In 1916-a uniform was adopted: ankle length long sleeved blue smock, white plastic collar and 3" cuffs, and a one piece apron; black shoes and stockings. The cap was a 4-inch straight piece of starched material, tied at the back. The black band was 1" wide. For the next few years the uniform was shortened or lengthened according to the style of the day.

In 1925-a new model was chosen for the cap, similar to what we have today except for the front fold length. The apron was shortened 10 inches.

In 1936-the cap fold was shortened, the black band narrowed and the blue smock remodelled.

In 1940-the navy blue 3/4 length cape with scarlet lining was adopted. On the collar were gold V.G.H. letters.

In 1941-white shoes and stockings were permitted. Seven years later the second year students were distinguished by a sky blue cap band.

In 1953, the V.G.H. letters on the capes were replaced by the letters St. J.G.H.

The school pin, adopted in 1918 had to be changed to include the new letters.

In 1963 - the school uniform was changed to a one piece white dress, duster style, with narrow green, white and gold stripes on the left breast pocket and a wide starched belt. The sky blue band was changed to a green color.

In September of 1966 the Ladies of the Hospital Auxiliary assumed the responsibility of operating the canteen. It had functioned since the opening of the new Hospital under the auspices of the C.N.I.B.



In December of 1966, Dr. E.J. Hanley, an Ophthomologist from Edmonton, began his bimonthly visits to Vegreville. Dr. Hanley and Mr. Belland or Mr. Sims from Optical Prescription brave the elements every second Thursday to meet the optical needs of the people of Vegreville and the surrounding districts. A very capable secretary, Mrs. Mary Tetreau, who is also a part-time secretary at the nursing school, keeps everyone happy and on time for appointments.

An intensive care committee was set up in 1968 to study the possibility of having a mobile intensive care unit in the hospital. A series of lectures on intensive care was given by the doctors with special emphasis on cardiac care. All nursing staff and Doctors attended the lectures. After a sizeable donation from the Ladies of the Hospital's Auxiliary plus several other cash gifts, the hospital was able to purchase some cardiac equipment.

During several months in early 1970, Miss Sylvia Zakordonski, a 1967 graduate, accepted the responsibility of setting up a Crash cart and carrying out lectures and practice sessions in cardiac care. Now, when one hears the Code One Signal, one knows that there will be plenty of action.

In May of 1969 Miss Lucille Ramsey took over the responsibility of Director of Nursing Service. Sister Mary Ellen who held this position previously, transferred to the School of Nursing.



The Staff Nurses' Association was established and officially recognized, in the spring of 1969, as the organization which was to represent the registered nurses employed in the hospital.





SCHOOL EVENTS

September 1965 saw the commencement of a twelve week experience in senior year responsibilities. During the same year a study day was organized each week for the senior students. The extra hours of study and review were much appreciated but - oh how those split days and nights off were detested!!!

Autumn 1967 saw another affiliation program organized. This time at the Minburn Eagle Auxiliary Hospital where an excellent course in Rehabilitation nursing was offered. The students experienced what it felt like to be fed by someone else or to eat with one arm in a sling or even worse, to know the frustrations of an affliction such as aphasia.

An overhead projector was purchased for the school in 1968. A real breakthrough for the instructors.

During the year 1968-1969 the decision was reached to phase out the school of nursing and no first year students were accepted in autumn 1969.

September 1969 saw us once more saying goodbye to our administrator, Sister Laura. Sister left Vegreville to assume the direction of the hospital in Tisdale, Saskatchewan. The position of Administrator was filled by Sister Mary Ellen O'Neill.

Since the total enrollment was only thirty in September 1969, it was decided to rent part of the residence to the Vegreville Health Unit for office space. Part of second floor plus the reception area was renovated slightly and is now being used by the Health Unit Staff. The classroom area plus third floor of the residence is used by the students.
