The time of training is drawing to its close for the young women who publish this book. We, the internes, who have worked with you, have also completed our training, and look upon you with fraternal fondness. Very shortly, the day will be here when we can hand out sage advice to our successors on that all important subject, "How To Get Along With Nurses." We shall set ourselves up as experts and tell of the "unnecessary" calls in the middle of the night. We shall probably paint portraits of you as terrible ogres, out to make a new interne's life miserable. But within a week the new boys will no doubt discover for themselves that you are working with them, not against them.
