

Ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the Board of Directors of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada, I have the pleasure and honour to present the recipient of the Alliance 2009 Performance Citation Award. The Citation Award is the highest distinction bestowed in Catholic health care in Canada.

This year the CHAC convention reminds us that reflecting on what we ought to do and who we ought to become, as individuals and as organizations, whether in the clinical, business, or social realms is the work of ethics. This evening we acknowledge an individual who for several decades has devoted her life to assisting individuals and organizations in undertaking such ethical reflection, and to further the understanding of the link between ethics and health policy in the public sphere.

Tonight we are pleased to present the 2008 CHAC Performance Citation Award to Dr. Nuala Kenny.

Dr. Kenny's impressive biography speaks to her qualifications for this special award. A member of the Sisters of Charity of Halifax, Dr. Kenny received her MD from Dalhousie University. She did post-graduate training at Dalhousie and Tufts-New England Medical Center, Boston and became a Fellow of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons of Canada in 1975. In 1999 she was appointed an Officer of the Order of Canada in recognition of her contributions to child health and medical education.

After an extensive career in paediatrics and medical education, Dr. Kenny founded the Department of Bioethics at Dalhousie in 1996. Author of over 100 papers and two books, her present research interests include professional character formation, ethics in health policy and public health, paediatric ethics, and end-of-life care. This work has earned her many honours, including the 2008 Canadian Bioethics Society

Lifetime Achievement Award and the 2008 Canadian Healthcare Association Distinguished Service Award

In addition to her academic work, Dr. Kenny is regularly involved in policy deliberations, particularly in relation to values and Canadian Medicare. In 1994 she was appointed by then-Prime Minister Jean Chretien to be a member of the National Forum on Health, which reported to the government on ways to improve Canada's health care system.

She sits on the board of Canadian Doctors for Medicare, and is a member of the Health Council of Canada, most recently serving as Chair of the Council's "Value for Money Steering Committee." Dr. Kenny has also served as Deputy Minister of Health for Nova Scotia.

Those who nominated her stated that the knowledge, commitment and enthusiasm Dr. Kenny brings in the area of ethics, the development of health care leaders, Catholic social teaching, and public policy development has made a lasting impact not only on Catholic health care but on the health care system in Canada as a whole.

As one person put it: "Sister Nuala has the ability to express compassion and understanding in dealing with patients and their loves ones as they face difficult choices, while at the same time addressing major public policy issues that will shape the future of Canada's health care system."

Sister Nuala, we want to acknowledge and express our appreciation for the leadership that you have shown and continue to provide in so many areas that are crucial to Catholic health care and to Canadian society today. You are rooted in the great legacy that has given rise to Catholic health care in Canada. Your pursuit of excellence and dedication has benefitted and inspired many of us. For this reason, on behalf of the Board of Directors of the CHAC, I am pleased to present you the 2009 CHAC Performance Citation Award.



Ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada, I have the pleasure and honour to present this year's distinguished recipient of the Alliance 2010 Performance Citation Award. Please join me in giving a warm welcome to Mr. Cliff Nordal. Mr. Cliff Nordal will soon complete a distinguished career of 41 years in hospital leadership. He is currently Ontario's longest serving CEO with 28 years at the helm of four different hospital organizations - Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Toronto, the Rehabilitation Institute of Toronto, St. Joseph's Health Care, London, and London Health Sciences Centre. Cliff is a recognized health care leader, whose energy and wisdom has served various health care policy initiatives at the local, provincial and national levels. He has contributed extensively to the professional development of health service executives as a lecturer and author. He has served as Chair of the Canadian College of Health Service Executives, the Council of Academic Hospitals of Ontario, and the Hospitals of Ontario Pension Plan.

Cliff has also served on various boards, including the Catholic Health Association of Ontario, the Ontario Hospital Association, and the Canadian Association for Quality in Health Care. In his twelve years in London, Cliff has demonstrated an unselfish dedication to others and to the ministry of Catholic health care, both locally and provincially. His significant contributions at St. Joseph's Health Care London have ensured the continued existence, vitality and future of Catholic health care in that city.

One of Mr. Nordal's peers remarked that "Cliff has been, for over a decade, the primary leader and change agent in creating in London ON the best example of an integrated system of hospital service in Ontario, and I daresay, in Canada. Under Cliff's leadership, integration with the secular side of the health care system has been massively advanced, yet Catholic health care has not suffered in the slightest."

Anther colleague has noted that "St. Joseph's continues to foster the mission of Catholic health care in expressing the healing ministry of Christ; it fosters a work environment characterized by respect for the dignity of persons, respect for life, compassion, and a concern for the marginalized; it ensures that the spiritual dimension of life is embraced, it strives

to promote ethical integrity in organizational and business practices as well as in patient care. And it has done all of this under Cliff Nordall's leadership." Many have noted that Cliff has been an extraordinary leader in and witness for the health care system in London and Canada. His selfless contribution to the Christian community is recognized by all in the Diocese of London.

Cliff has been instrumental in promoting numerous committees within St. Joseph's Health Care that have expanded our understanding of what it means to be a Catholic health care centre today. Huge studies have been completed at St. Joseph's concerning the spiritual dimensions necessary for a Catholic facility and the definition of what it means to have a Catholic mission in a pluralistic environment. In many ways, the Christian roots and Catholicity of St. Joseph's Health System has never had a higher profile, all due to Cliff Nordal as the CEO.

Cliff leaves his post as a tribute to the continuing legacy of the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Diocese of London. The Christian context of St. Joseph's seems to have tapped into his own Christian roots and resulted in many wonderful events in the city that have very often been a powerful witness to the Catholic ethos of St. Joseph. The spiritual care program, second to none in the city, has received his ongoing support.

No better tribute can be given to a person than to be accepted and affirmed by the people who work with him on a daily basis. And so we leave the final work to his own Leadership & Support Team Members at St. Joseph's Health Care in London. They state, "Cliff Nordal has been the key to our ability to keep moving forward and to work in collaboration with others, while never losing sight of our Christian ethos and all that it means to provide care, develop our staff and engage our community. We have renewed our mission and have integrated key strategies into our organizational plans that will strengthen Catholic health care in our community for years to come."

In conclusion, Ladies and Gentlemen, what Cliff Nordal has accomplished in London Ontario stands as a model for health care generally, but in particular for Catholic health care in Ontario and in the whole of Canada, and it would not have happened but for the extraordinary and his focused leadership.

The Performance Citation Award is the highest distinction in Catholic health care in Canada. This year as we reflect together, we are reminded that what we ought to do and who we ought to become, both as individuals and as Catholic organizations, is more important than ever.

For more than 35 years, Sister Sarah has been actively involved in Catholic health care, both in Ontario and at the national level. Originally a Physiotherapist, Sister Sarah continues to evolve an impressive career that influences and guides individuals, organizations and communities through compassion and growth in Catholic Mission and values.

Sister Sarah was President of St. Joseph's General Hospital in Elliot Lake for many years, where she had a direct and positive influence on the staff, patients and the greater community. She left Elliot Lake to take on the position of Vice President of the newly formed Catholic Health Corporation of Ontario where, in 1998, she helped create the current sponsorship model that is now made up of seven congregations and the Catholic Health Association of Ontario. Part of her responsibilities was Mission and Education for CHCO, leading organizational discussions around institutional Mission. Trustee and Senior

Leadership education, as well as facilitation of board retreats.

As the CHCO board nominee to the Catholic Health Association Board, when it made the difficult decision to change to a secretariat as the Catholic Health Alliance, all appreciated her wisdom and grace through the decision-making process.

Sister Sarah helps to coordinate and deliver the Catholic Leadership educational program now provided to institutions across Ontario and in New Brunswick. Sister Sarah has been instrumental in developing programs for trustees and middle managers of Catholic facilities throughout Ontario that link the values of the institution to the work performed. Her delivery of the message of Catholic Mission has had visible impact at both the personal and organizational level, demonstrated by the very positive feedback from the current leaders of our facilities who have participated in the Foundations, Trustee and organizational planning sessions for over 12 years.

Sister Sarah, for your personal commitment to education of the Catholic Mission and for the impressive outcomes which have inspired personal spiritual growth and organizational development, the Governing Council of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada is pleased to present you with the 2011 Performance Citation Award

Over the years, Pat has given much of her time to various board, university and community organizations, and has served on numerous local, provincial and national organizations. Ladies and gentlemen, on behalf of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada, I have the pleasure and honour to present this year's recipients of the 2014 Lifetime Achievement Award, Sister Sheila Langton. Over several decades, Sister Sheila has touched the lives of many people throughout Canada, and mentored numerous leaders in the Catholic health care ministry. As a Sister of Providence of St. Vincent de Paul she has served as the Administrator of St. Mary's Hospital in Camrose, Alberta and of a long-term care facility in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan.

Following these experiences Sister Sheila participated on a number of boards to plan and shape the evolution of Catholic health care in Canada. She was instrumental in the establishment of lay public juridic persons across Canada when these structures were still unknown and untested. She guided the formation of Providence Healthcare, Vancouver; the Alberta Catholic Health Corporation (now Catholic Health of Alberta); Catholic Health Ministry of Saskatchewan; and the Catholic Health Corporation of Ontario.

Through her foresight and understanding of the dynamics of change she assisted various communities of Sisters as they transferred their health care organizations to lay responsibility. She has influenced the structure of Catholic care by ensuring organizations are grouped and governed with care by dedicated and knowledgeable people.

To many people Sister Sheila is best known for her efforts to support health care Administrators and Board Chairpersons, encouraging them to offer their gifts and leadership in the ministry of health care. This was expressed by one of the nominators as follows: "It was Sister Sheila who convinced me, perhaps pushed me, to take on a leadership role. That was at a time when I was not sure I was ready. But she placed her trust in me and when times were tough she was always there ready to support and encourage."

Those who nominated Sister Sheila for this award emphasized that at the heart of all her efforts there is a central vision: to serve the needs of the most vulnerable. In an interview conducted not long ago Sister Sheila was asked about her call to religious life. In her response she said: "It was in novitiate that I learned that these Sisters were gifted with compassionate care for God's people, especially the most destitute, the poorest, the most needy, the most vulnerable. They served others in a spirit of humility, simplicity and charity and they always relied on the Providence of God."

Sister Sheila, over the years that you have served in Catholic health care, we have witnessed for ourselves how you, too, have been gifted with this same spirit and with the same compassionate care for God's people. They describe him as an outstanding nursing leader known for his work with the vulnerable including: aboriginal communities: those who are homeless; people living with learning disabilities and mental health challenges, as well as HIV and substance misuse. His nomination includes a long list of achievements:

- In the area of HIV and AIDS, Scott led the STOP HIV Program (Seek and Treat for Optimal Prevention of HIV/AIDS) within the HIV program at Providence Health Care – an initiative for which the team received the Premier's Award.
- He helped create the Pacific to Prairie Partnership, sharing knowledge and expertise with caregivers in Saskatchewan who were experiencing the highest rates of new HIV infections in Canada – an initiative for which he received accolades from the Saskatchewan Ministry of Health.
- He operates an addiction research clinic in the downtown eastside seeking new and effective

- treatment for the most vulnerable and addicted people in the province of British Columbia.
- To promote the dignity of members of the aboriginal community he partnered with the Mission and Pastoral Care teams to create an all-nations sacred space where traditional healing ceremonies can be held.

Scott's personal commitment and the achievements of his team have been acknowledged through numerous awards, including the following:

- Scott was part of the team that received the Premier's Award for a Homeless Intervention project in 2009.
- In 2010, he received the Individual Mission Award of Providence Health Care for his outstanding contribution to and promtion of the organization's mission and the Catholic health ministry.
- He received a provincial award for advocacy from the College of Registered Nurses of British Columbia in 2011.

Scott is known for not only ensuring that the most vulnerable populations are treated and attended to holistically, he applies the same values in working with his team members. He is highly respected and sought out by his team as a mentor. He is recognized for his ability to articulate a clear vision for his program and services, and is a role model of leading through compassion and social justice while promoting excellence in care, research, and teaching for everyone the organization serves.

For staff, physicians and partners, Dianne was the enduring face of PHC, her servant leadership style synonymous with the Catholic mission of the healing ministry of Jesus Christ in Health care: putting others before self, meeting the needs of the most vulnerable, and leading with compassion, courage, vision and strength of conviction.

Dianne was a highly visible leader, frequently attending Providence's 16 sites, meeting with patients, residents, families, staff and physicians. Her enduring legacy at Providence evidences the truth of her oft-mentioned mantra: "none of us achieves great things alone, but only with others." With others, she:

- led the re-imagination of PHC's vision with an eye on serving the vulnerable and marginalized,
- established Providence's Centre for Excellence in HIV/AIDS whose ground-breaking approach has been recognized by organizations such as the WHO and the United Nations;
- created services for youth at risk;
- and achieved exemplary standing with Accreditation Canada in 2013 and 2017.

Dianne's commitment to leadership and governance is evidenced by her continuous appointments to boards including:

- President and board member of the denominational health association in BC.
- Chair of the Provincial Catholic association,
- Vice chair of the National Alliance's Governing Council, and Chair to the predecessor National Association

Never wavering from her commitment to the values and beliefs foundational to Catholic healthcare, Dianne showed great courage

in guiding Providence in many difficult and controversial matters including:

- a constitutional challenge against the federal government when legislative changes prevented physicians from administering a medication to patients with treatment-resistant addiction,
- launching "Angel's Cradle" providing a safe haven for infants abandoned by mothers unable to care for them.
- navigating ethical decisions associated with the opioid crisis and Medical Assistance in Dying,

Not long before her retirement from Providence she gained formal support for the redevelopment of the new St. Paul's Hospital as an integrated campus of care. This remarkable achievement ensures that PHC and Catholic healthcare in BC will continue to thrive for many years to come. More importantly, she has been able to inspire people of all faith, traditions & cultures within CHCM's sponsored communities of service and on a provincial, national and international level, to discover a deeper sense of meaning & connection to their work.



She has led the ministry at its highest level for 18 years as President and Board Chair of the St. Joseph's Health System (SJHS), guiding it through its transition from being operated by the Sisters, to a corporation governed by a PJP Sponsor and lay board. Working with Philanthropic donors, she also helped build the reputation of Saint Joseph's Health System as an academic health sciences network affiliated with McMaster University with internationally recognized research.

Her accomplishments span both the health care and academic spheres. She has also held numerous leadership roles in the Faculty of Theology and Pontifical Institute of Medieval Studies at the University of St. Michael's College in Toronto.

She encouraged SJHS to play a role in supporting the health services of indigenous communities,

including a Dialysis Centre on the Six Nations Reserve and a partnership with the Government of Nunavut to improve safety and services for Inuit peoples. She supported the growth and development of an International Outreach Program, which today partners with McMaster University to train physicians in Guyana, Haiti and Uganda.



On behalf of the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada, I am delighted to highlight the servant leadership of Mr. Jean Piche of Winnipeg, Manitoba.

The whole of Jean 30-year career has been in Catholic health care and he has dedicated himself to promoting and role modelling our values at a municipal, regional, provincial and national level

Jean started as a young orderly at the Taché Center and St. Boniface Hospital. He was already a person with a strong sense of values and what he found in the Grey Nuns was a way to express his values through his work.

After obtaining a law degree and a Masters of Health Services Administration, he joined St. Boniface Hospital in 1991 where he went on to hold leadership roles, while also completing the Catholic Health Care Leadership Program.

He often remarks that this program gave him a solid understanding of the value of the religious congregations and the mission of Catholic health care. She also served as the pandemic response lead for the Vancouver Emergency Operations Centre for LTC and Assisted Living. What an incredibly important role to play.

During Jo-Ann's leadership years at Providence Health Care she:

- Opened the first tertiary mental health program serving older adults who previously had been institutionalized in large psychiatric hospitals. This is life changing work;
- She also developed a vision for redeveloping ageing infrastructure and a new clinical services plan, which included Canada's first publicly funded dementia village on Vancouver Island – quite remarkable;

• Jo-Ann Co-created and implemented a culture change initiative which focused on the experience of residents, their loved ones and the people who work in homes, for this work she was received the BC Patient Safety & Quality Council - Quality Culture Trailblazer award in 2018.

She has been a member of the Board of Catholic Health Association of British Columbia (CHABC) since 2009 where she was instrumental in creating visitation programs to help parishes find and support people in their community who are isolated and alone. And I am going to finish with a quote.

In his letter of support Archbishop Michael Miller of Vancouver writes: "Jo-Ann exemplifies imaginative dedication to all that she takes on. Her compassionate, tireless efforts for the good of those she serves, particularly people living in care facilities, is a model of servant leadership.

Jo-Ann's strong values are the essence of her deep commitment to service, and her leadership influence is such that those who work alongside her come to share her passionate and principled approach to the task at hand. This is how Jo-Ann's work crosses over into true ministry."

I think that speaks beautifully to Jo-Ann's personal qualities.

This is the first opportunity the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada present an awards in a new category — the Programs of Distinction Award. It is given to an organization that is the creator and lead sponsor or partner in an original, bold, innovative program that delivers measurable results for the community served. We would like to recognize the Mobile Outreach and Support Team (MOST) at Hôtel-Dieu Grace Healthcare (HDGH) in Windsor, Ontario as one such Program of Distinction.

While the problem of homelessness is not new to the City of Windsor, the associated vulnerability of the homeless population has increasingly become a critical social issue. Recent trends in homelessness include an increase in prevalence of those considered most vulnerable, like families, youth, people living with physical disabilities and persons with severe and persistent mental illness and/or concurrent disorders. Hôtel-Dieu Grace Healthcare partnered other organizations in Windso to share resources and build on their expertise to help address the important issues of homelessness and mental illness and addictions in the community.

Together, these agencies launched a new initiative called MOST: The Mobile Outreach and Support Team. The goal of this innovative program is to offer an inter-agency outreach team that engages with hard-to-reach homeless individuals experiencing mental health and addiction concerns in their own environment to develop trust, address immediate needs, and provide supported linkages to essential health, social and community services.

In a one year period, there were 3,726 visits to the MOST van. In almost all of those encounters food, warmth/cooling items and hygiene items were provided. Health care needs can be attended to through MOST but the program also works to address the broader determinants of health.

Hôtel-Dieu Grace Healthcare's mission is to serve the healthcare needs of the community including those who are vulnerable and/or marginalized in any way, be it physically, socially, or mentally. The MOST program is perhaps the best demonstration of how partnership and collaboration, and bringing together four distinct organizations, can reach beyond institutions and traditional modes of service delivery to better meet the needs of the most vulnerable citizens. For this reason Mobile Outreach and Support Team (MOST) at Hôtel-Dieu Grace Healthcare (HDGH) in Windsor, Ontario is judged worthy of a Program of Distinction Award.

Regional Specialty Mental Health Services Providence Care Kingston, Ontario

The 2nd Programs of Distinction Award this year recognizes the Regional Specialty Mental Health Services of Providence Care in Kingston, Ontario.

Providence Care, grounded in its Mission, worked collaboratively with community partners to co-design a Specialty Outreach Service to meet the needs of marginalized rural families in the Frontenac, Lennox & Addington rural area surrounding Kingston. Rural Canadians have fewer mental health resources, increased wait times, and a limited access to specialty services. They also experience physical isolation, lack of transportation, program infrastructure, and intergenerational poverty. This often leads to health inequities such as a higher than provincial average need for mental health care services.

Providence Care addressed this need by engaging service recipients/providers in a qualitative research project that sought to foster a deeper understanding of compassionate client

centred mental health care in rural areas. In the spirit of being called to be neighbours to one another and to offer compassionate care and healing, Outreach Clinicians are headquartered in local rural and isolated communities and have implemented "mental health rounds" for family physician offices in rural areas. Every six weeks Regional Outreach clinicians from Providence Care attend the primary care practitioner clinic, meet with family physicians, nurses, Addictions & Mental Health Agency staff and Allied Health staff from the primary care clinic for consultations and to begin service in real time.

While many people receive acute care services in Kingston, it is essential that long-term support as well as rehabilitation need to be delivered closer to home. Shifting the locus of care from Kingston to rural communities has eliminated barriers to access and respected the wishes of those communities. Providence Care has intentionally sought to design a service that focuses on the needs of an underserved, marginalized population.

For these reasons, the Catholic Health Alliance of Canada would like to recognize the Regional Specialty Mental Health Services of Providence Care in Kingston, Ontario as a Program of Distinction



A parent from Moose Factory wrote: "Thank you for everything you have done for us throughout the holidays. It's not easy for anyone to not be home for the holidays let alone stay for another 6 – 9 weeks. Now that our child is here it was all worth it. Thank you for the gift cards, they certainly come in handy and also for checking up on us."

A patient from Moosonee wrote to program staff: "You came quietly into my private world and let me be me, you tried to understand me, you allowed me the dignity of making my own decisions...! think that you are terrific."

In the words of the nominator:


